LIBERAL IN SENATE

Senator Choquette Who Once Campaigned With Laurier Strongly Opposed to Adoption of Measure Before Recourse to People --- Supported Amendment of Conservative Senator.

Ottawa, April 29.—In the Senate today Senator Choquette bolted on the naval defence bill siding with Senator Lougheed. He said Sir Wilfrid Laurier had recently promised his popularity in the past by energetically opposing all projects leading to lead Canada toward imperialism.

Senator Dandurand in the course of an extended speech in defence of the bill said that eight provinces were unanimously for this bill, and so was the great majority in Quebec. The movement from here led by Mr. Monk hardly gave the Senate warrant to endorse Senator Lougheed's amendment.
