Coroner Berryman Found Knife Bearing Initials "R. H." and Watch Near the Bones---Joseph Dalzell Can Positively Identify the Fishing Rod Which was Found.

After 16 long years the haze of mystery and doubt that surrounded the disappearance of Robert Horne, who left his home 41 Richmond street on May 30th, 1894, was solved yesterday afternoon when Coroner D. E. Berryman visited Black River road about two miles from the nearest residence and about seven miles from the city, where the remains of a man were discovered on Tuesday, and found articles that were known to be in the possession of Mr. Horne at the time of his distance on the single thing remains that could tell the story of his sad and tragic end. That the bones which were discovered by Edgar Beyea, a milk man, who resides in that vicinity and which were received yesterday by the coroner, are the remains of Robert Horne, Dr. Berryman said last evening he had not the least doubt. The knife, watch and also a fishing rod which were found were brought to the city, and are in the possession of the coroner, and an effort will be made to have them identified today.

Coroner Berryman said last night that he had not yet decided whether he would hold an inquest. He did not think that an inquest would be necessary. It is thought that no difficulty will be found in having the articles identified.

The Man Who Fixed the Rod. Mr. Joseph Dalzell when seen by a Standard reporter last evening said that he could easily identify the fishing rod. He remembered clearly the kind of rod Mr. Horne had in his possession, as he had repaired it form in the day before he had gone on the fishing trip. LOBSTER HATCHERIES HAVE HAD GOOD YEAR

City After Inspection of District Says Outlook is Very Promising.

That the lobster hatcheries in the provinces have received as many eggs to date this season and that the outlook for a good output of lobsters is as good as ever before, is the opinion of Alexander Finleyson, an inspector from the department of marine and fisheries, at Ottawa, who pasesd through the city yesterday on his way back to Ottawa after an inspection trip through the provinces. He has five hatcheries—in his jurisdiction. They are located at the Magdalen Islands, at Pictou county, Chamaguey, Port Daniel and Caraquet and at the present time they are half filled with the eggs. So far as the season has advanced the number of eggs collected is as large as in the best previous years, is the opinion of Mr. Finleyson.
