# SHIPPING FINANCE

## PRODUCE PRICES IN CANADIAN CENTRES

Montreal, Dec. 30.—A feature of the flour trade was continued increased demand from foreign buyers for spring wheat grades. There is no change in the condition of the local market, prices being steady, but the volume of business doing is small. Prices per barrel in bags:

FLOUR—Manitoba spring wheat patents firsts, \$5.00; do seconds, \$5.10; winter wheat patents, \$4.75 to \$5.00; Manitoba spring bakers, \$4.90; straight rollers, \$4.35 to \$4.50; straight rollers in bags, \$2 to \$2.05; extras, \$1.65 to \$1.75.

EGGS—There are no new developments in the egg market. Prices are firmly maintained and small supplies. Sales of selected stock at 27 cents, and No. 1 stock at 27 cents, and No. 2 at 23 cents to 24 cents.

POTATOES—There is a steady demand for potatoes at all levels. Sales of car lots of Green Mountain stock at \$2 1/2 cents, and in a jobbing way at \$1 per bag.

HAY—No. 1 hay, \$11 to \$11.50; extra No. 2 hay, \$10 to \$10.50; clover, \$7 to \$7.50; clover mixed, \$7.50 to \$8; No. 2 hay, \$9 to \$9.50.

MILFEED—The market for all lines of milfeed is firm, and prices show no change. The demand is good and supplies light. Prices: Ontario bran, \$19 to \$20; Ontario middlings, \$22 to \$22.50; Manitoba shorts, \$21 to \$22; Manitoba bran, \$18 to \$20; pure grain mouline, \$31 to \$32; mixed mouline, \$25 to \$28.

OATS—No. 2 Canadian Western 38 cents to 39 1/2 cents; extra No. 1, 38 1/2 to 39 cents; No. 3 Canadian Western, 38 cents to 38 1/2 cents; No. 3 local white, 36 1/2 cents; No. 4 local white, 35 1/2 cents; Manitoba barley No. 4, 48 cents to 48 1/2 cents.

WHEAT, 2802 bags of flour and 1669 boxes of cheese. The steamer had a full outward cargo which is valued at \$42,111.

During yesterday's heavy blow the schooner Hartney, W. and Annie E. Banks collided in the harbor. The running gear of both vessels was slightly damaged. The Banks was towed to the wharf.

WHEAT EXPORTS.

(Bradstreet's.)

Wheat, including flour exports from the United States and Canada for the week ending Dec. 23, as reported by telegraph to Bradstreet's aggregate 2,179,929 bushels, against 3,689,456 this week last year.

Trade in Canada shows the usual quiet experienced after the Christmas holidays. Stock taking rules in wholesale and jobbing circles. Retail trade in holiday goods was of exceptionally heavy proportion. The outlook for next year is encouraging. Montreal reports that business in all lines is light that inventories are in low order and that collections are fair. Business failures for the week terminating with Thursday, number 35, which compares with 22 in the corresponding week last year.

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## EXCHANGE RATE

LOWEST OF YEAR

Revenues, Dec. 30.—Prices advanced some more during the early session on the stock exchange today, but the movement was narrower and the total over turn of nominal proportion. Gains were registered by a majority of the better known issues, but other stocks were comparatively neglected. The short interest which is believed to be large, covered extensively during the early days of the week, but the selling that followed today's early advances was accepted as evidence of the market's thinness, and inability to absorb much stock. Bonds were again fairly active, but the largest part of the business in these securities was transacted by direct and private sales.

Trading on the exchange dwindled in the late session, but prices held fairly steady, though the closing was at general recessions from top level. Reading lost some of its early gain, probably on disappointment following the publication of November earnings, which were below expectations. The advance in price in United States Steel, was wiped out. A rise in call money to seven per cent, the highest rate since the first week of the year, and a decline in foreign exchange to 48.85, the lowest level since the panic of 1907, were rather more noteworthy than events in the stock market.

The advance in call money was ascribed to calling of loans by local institutions, to meet year-end requirements and the decline in exchange was a direct result of the advance in call loans. Naturally the turn in foreign exchange revived rumors of gold importing agreements, but nothing materialized in that direction in the course of the day. According to forecasts, banks in the clearing house ought to gain from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000 this week, but the advance in the loan account is hazardous in view of the many sub-surface conditions which beset the larger institutions at the end of the year.

Railroad reports included that of the Reading Company for November, which showed a decrease in net earnings by the transportation company. The net earnings of the Reading Company of the coal and iron company showed but nominal increase. The Rock Island line for November were decidedly favorable of \$413,000. The various lines of the St. Louis and San Francisco system reported an increase in operating income for November of \$183,000.

London bought a few thousand stocks on balance in this market. Total sales of bonds, par value \$2,620,000. U. S. bonds were unchanged.
