

HARRIMAN LINES DISSOLUTION PLAN RATIFIED

Both the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific boards have ratified dissolution plan decided upon by the two committees and approved by Attorney General Wickham. A statement may be issued late this afternoon, but it is possible it will be deferred till morning.

Southern Pacific stock held by Union Pacific will be offered to holders of both companies as of record March 20th or March 21st, and payment for stock will be made in four installments with provision for advance payment. Stock will be offered at par flat but with deduction of dividend payable April 1st, which means a price of 98 5/8 which stockholders will readily pay. Southern Pacific stockholders will be entitled to one share of Southern Pacific stock for every three shares now held and Union Pacific stockholders will be entitled to one share of Southern Pacific stock for every four shares of Union Pacific now held. The plan provides for the necessary money to be raised without much trouble. When it was decided, however, that the Kentucky law prohibited Southern Pacific from accepting its own stock and that it would therefore be necessary to market the entire amount of \$126,650,000 the bankers satisfied the attorney general that they would have to have utter freedom in forming the syndicate to prevent a serious disturbance of the market assurance being given that the syndicate would so handle stock as to carry out supreme court's decree insisting on wide distribution thereof. The railroad management now hopes to have plan in shape for presentation to the court Saturday.

CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

New York, Feb. 6.—The general flatness of speculation in market was pronounced today and stimulated merely by that professionals were pursuing their vocations. Certain specialties stood out in mild relief in sympathy with specific news influences bearing upon them but even here the dealings were unimportant. It is said there has not been a time in many years, when speculation has reached such a degree of stagnation. According to gossip many specialties in various stocks reported that their books had not been so bare of orders within their memory. It's clear that manipulation of every character has ceased. There was a semblance of calmness in the Harriman Pacific stocks during the day in anticipation of the promised announcement of the segregation plan this afternoon. The market had fairly definite knowledge of the terms of the agreement reached with the attorney general but was inclined to await official information and an initiative from responsible sources. The market closed without animation and it is doubtful if the official announcement of Union Pacific-Southern Pacific plan will stimulate any particular activity either way.

New York, Feb. 6.—Fairly liberal offerings served merely to check the advance and produced dullness on reactions which was considered a sign of better conditions. There is still little disposition on any quarter to take a vigorous position either way until a little better line may be had on the new crop prospects. Meantime however, the trend of the movement mill interests more willing to buy cotton on every prediction. The spinning demand is satisfactory all things considered and in event of an early cessation of the Balkan war the European demand should be considerably augmented. It will be too early several weeks from this to prognosticate anything with regard to the new crop acreage. Meantime, granting the sake of argument the extreme bear crop estimates, we see nothing in the situation or prospect to warrant lower prices.

NEW YORK DRAWS THE COLOR LINE

New York, Feb. 6.—A new rule prohibiting in future bouts between white persons and negroes otherwise known as "colored bouts," was adopted by the New York State Athletic Commission which controls boxing in this state. The commission today's meeting considered the official of the Washington Athletic Club of Brooklyn, from blame for the accidental death of "Chick" Rose, a pugilist, after a bout there two weeks ago. It was announced that one week from today the license of all men at present authorized by the commission to act as referees at bouts in this state will become inoperative and that a new list of referees for professional and amateur bouts has been endorsed by the commission.
