MARKET PICKED UP IN THE AFTERNOON

And Iron Among Most
Active.

ANOTHER NEW MARK

Montreal Exchange Bullish
Morning Became Broad-
er and Active and Fairly
Buoyant After Midday.

Montreal, May 9.—With Wall Street in a hesitating mood in view of the complications which might arise from the German submarine campaign and the possibility in the torpedoing of the Lusitania with her cargo of ammunition close on the heels of the new understanding between the United States and Germany the local market indulged in some more bullish display today. In Detroit, Scotia and Iron Ore were the chief factors.

General Interest in Locomotives was also a feature. Detroit, at yesterday's remarkable advance over eight points hastened to establish a fresh record by opening at 111 1/2, and closing with 110 1/2 yesterday, and yesterday noon to 112, which remained the session's record.

In the subsequent dealings the price reacted to 110 1/4, profit taking, however, figuring to some extent in reaction.

The buying of Scotia was very

of that issue, and after starting at 114 1-4 compared with 114 yesterday it rose to 116 1-2, and closed moon at 116.

A better market for Iron also developed, and from 50 it moved up to 51 25, but Steel, of Canada, surrounded its best level of the past couple of weeks at 59 1-2 to 59 3-4.

The market grew broader, more active and quite buoyant in the afternoon for Chicago, Detroit, Steel of Canada and Iron from the most active while Textile, Ontario Steel and various factories displayed market strength.

Sooths continued its early strength, reaching a new high on the movement at 118, after starting at 116.

Detroit, after its early reaction of 112, started at 110 3-4, and touched another new high at 113.

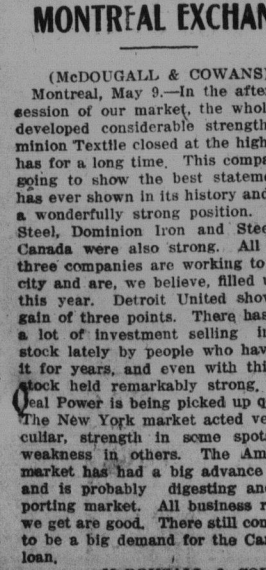
The strength of Steels against the strength of Canada, which went to 59 35, while Iron went as high as 51 25. Textile opened one above on close, from 83 to 84, and finally closing to 85.
