## THE SHAMROCKS WON FROM THE ROSES 7-3

Listless Game in St. Peter's  
League Last Night Attend-  
ed by Few Spectators.

With eighteen knot holes, thirty-seven batters and four spectators on the grandstand the Roses and Shamrocks played nine innings of agonizing baseball on St. Peter's grounds last night. Although the game was fairly tight it seemed to lack the vim and interest usually found when the Shamrocks put on their ball togs. The game went to the Shamrocks 7 to 3.

Hansen the owner, manager and boss of that nomadic horde, called the Roses, made several changes on the field, but all his shake-ups failed to help stem the tide of defeat.

McMurray started away in the driver's seat for the Roses, but was replaced by Jobby Harrington in the fifth. Harrington allowed two hits, Murphy and Haggerty doing the trick.

When Jobby gets warmed up he can play some ball, even though he has been in the game since confederation.

Garvin handled the big mit for Hansen after Jobby relieved McMurray, and managed to come through without a demerit mark.

The new outfielder for the Roses, young White, showed class and was favor among the few spectators.

Haggerty and Murphy were the only two who were credited with errors for the Roses.

The incontestible princes of the infield, Murphy, Howard, Knudson and Perry were on their toes last night. Murphy came near to losing his reputation in the ninth when he muffed three thrown balls. These, however, did not prove disastrous, but it was not Murphy's fault.

Perry, the scientist of the diamond, allowed the Roses only four hits and recorded ten strike-outs. Mugsy was his butty for the game. Mugsy came nearly losing his good looks in the fourth, when he and McMurray collided. Fortunately, however, he did sustain serious injury, and will be in his old position tonight.

Haggerty is hitting the punching trail again and made one of the two hits last night. He is a deer on the bases, but he seldom gets on. Perhaps last night was just the starting of a grand batting average in the final run.

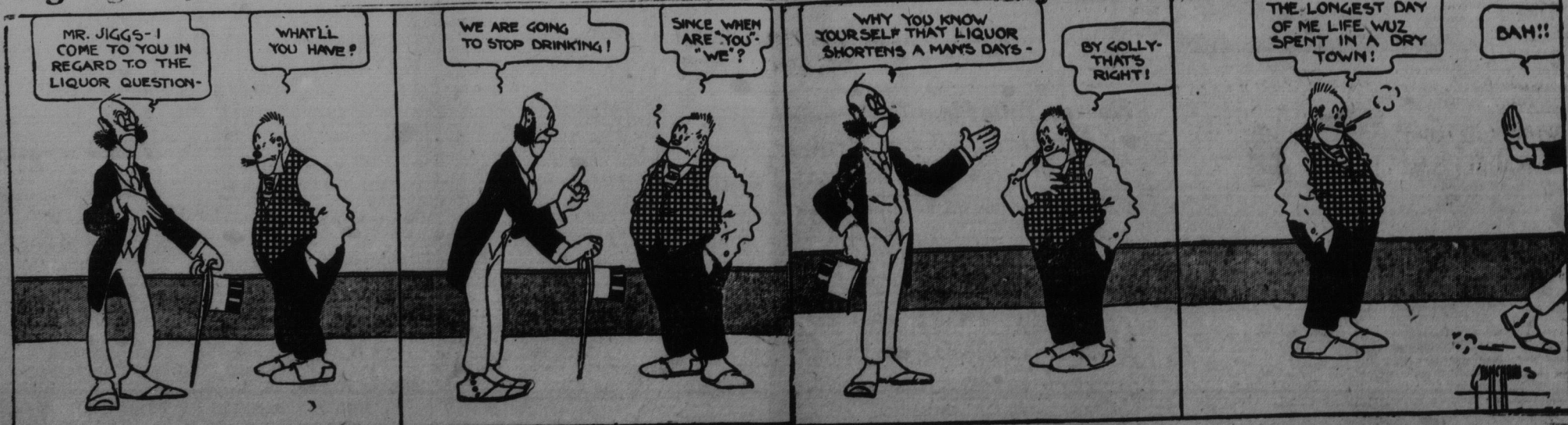
