Miss Harriet Willett, of the Red Cross committee will send in her report to the local Red Cross at the end of the month. Four pairs of pajamas and eleven skeins of wool were taken out at the last meeting.

Letters were read by the secretary from C. B. Allen, secretary of the Navy League; the French Red Cross, Nursing Sister Edith Hegan and Miss Keefe.

The expenses of the berry pickers were ordered paid.

Miss Bessie Pike told of the progress of the patient cared for by the society at River Glade, and that the doctor reports her as cured and ready to leave the institution. Miss Pike, Miss Price and Miss Brock were appointed as a committee to look after future plans.

For the emergency committee Miss Brock, convener, reported that there had been no calls since the last meeting.

The moonlight excursion so kindly given for the Y. W. P. A. by the 7th Garrison Regiment will be sold for the benefit of the Imperial for War Anniversary service.

The matter of the Saturday picnic at Red Head was left to Miss Price to arrange.

Tickets for the French Red Cross benefit were distributed.

The bag crocheted by Miss Alice Rising was accepted and will be sold for the benefit of the Navy League.

\$10 was voted to the French Red Cross moved by Miss Barnes, seconded by Miss McNeil, but on an amendment the sum was made \$25.

Members were reminded of the talent money to be raised.

CANADIAN EDITORS AND REPORTERS ARE BEING ENTERTAINED

London, July 11.—(British Wireless Service)—For the purpose of acquainting themselves with the conditions on the "home front" in England at the end of the fourth year of the war, a party of distinguished Canadian newspaper reporters and editors arrived in England yesterday.

The visit of the Dominion journalists is the first of a series of official tours by the representatives of the press of the British overseas dominions and crown colonies to be arranged by the ministry of information.

Lord Beaverbrook, minister of information and formerly official eye witness with the Canadian troops, will give the members of the party an official reception at a banquet at the Savoy Hotel tomorrow night. They are guests of the Lord Mayor of London at a dinner given today at the Mansion House in honor of the Dominion Ministers, who are in England.
