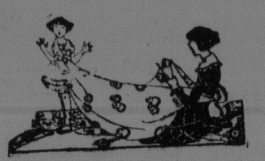

## Regular Meeting Of School Board

Decided Last Evening to Secure Extra Assistant to Secretary—The Coal Supply—Many Matters of Interest Transacted.

At the regular meeting of the St. John School Board which was held in the Trustees office, Hazen avenue, last evening, with Dr. A. F. Emery in the chair, the action of the committee appointed to secure an extra assistant for secretary Leavitt, was confirmed. The chairman of the finance committee, H. Colby Smith, stated that the committee had engaged Miss Delia MacLeod at a salary of \$800 per year. Trustee Colby, of the buildings committee reported the 250 tons of soft coal had been secured from the Colwell Fuel Co., at \$12.50 per ton, and 180 tons of broken anthracite at \$18 per ton. The tender of J. S. Gibson Co., for 500 tons of Nova Scotia coal at \$12.50 per ton was also accepted. The trustee also reported that the schools still lacked 500 tons of their usual supply.

The minutes of the last regular meeting, including the chairman, Dr. F. A. Emery, Mrs. Richard O'Brien, G. R. Day, M. Colby Smith, H. Colby Smith, Dr. H. S. Bridges, H. Colby Smith and H. D. Green.

The minutes of the last regular meeting and of several committee meetings were read by the secretary and adopted by the meeting.

The chairman reported verbally that a legal opinion had been received from Dr. J. H. M. Baxter, stating that the School Board did not have the power to issue bonds for the financing of a proposed vocational school. The chairman said that while the work would be hampered it would still be carried on in room hired for the purpose.

The secretary reported that in regard to securing the redemption of certain bonds which had fallen due, Dr. Baxter had been of the opinion that the school board could not have the power to secure their redemption until a special act had been passed to that effect by the Provincial Legislature. Several communications were referred to the teachers' committee.

They included a letter thanking the Board for salary received during her illness in the month of June from Margaret M. Graham.

The resignation of M. Augusta Emerson from the teaching staff. An application for an assistant of leave of absence for another year from Dorothy F. Smith, of St. Martins who wished to continue college work.

Applications for appointments to the teaching staff from Bernard V. Stewart, of Colas Island and Mary A. Howard, Miss Howard is the daughter of a former clergyman of this city. She stated that she was a graduate of Mount Allison, and had one year's experience in the schools of New Brunswick, and two years in those of Alberta.

The report of the medical inspector of schools, Dr. Mabel Huntington, was received and referred to a committee consisting of the chairman, the Superintendent of schools, Mrs. O'Brien and Trustee Day.

Trustee Smith reported that the committee appointed for the purpose had secured an assistant for Secretary Leavitt. The services of Delia MacLeod had been secured at a salary of \$800 per annum. The action of the committee was sustained.

Trustee Green wished to know if the appointment was to be a permanent one. Trustee Smith said that an assistant was absolutely necessary as the secretary and his assistant Miss Reid, found the volume of work increased to such an extent that they were absolutely unable to cope with it. He was of the opinion that two additional assistants would not be out of the question.

Trustee Green thought that as much of the additional work had been caused by the vocational schools they should be required to bear the additional expense incurred.

Dr. Emery said that a special stenographer has been called to do the work of the vocational schools.

Secretary Leavitt informed the meeting that the minutes of all the meetings and reports of the vocational committee had been done by him personally, and he had been obliged to work on holidays and Sundays to keep up with the work.

The action of a committee granting a salary of \$600 to the secretary's new assistant was then confirmed by the board.

On motion all outstanding bills were ordered paid.

Progress was reported by the committees in charge of the new West Side and North End schools.

Trustee Colby said that some of the janitors of the different school buildings had the custom of leaving the city for indefinite periods in the summer, and without advising the School Board, so that it had been found impossible to secure entrance to some of the buildings. He had recently visited one school to see how much coal remained on hand. The janitor was away, and although entrance was secured to every other room in the school, the coal room was under lock and key, and the janitor had the key. He thought that the board should take action to see that the janitors be required to advise whether the secretary or visitors of the different schools of their movements during the vacation.

Dr. Bridges said that such had been the custom in the past.

The Superintendent submitted a verbal report of the unveiling of a tablet in the Albert school on June 24th, to commemorate the memory of a former principal, the late Col. A. E. G. MacKenzie, officer in command of the 26th Battalion, who was killed in action in France.

Dr. Bridges said that the order kept by the children during the ceremony had made a most favorable impression. He also said that the children had sung "My Own Canadian Home" during the ceremony. Asked by Trustee Green as to whether the song was the official National Anthem, the doctor replied that the children had sung "My Own Canadian Home" during the ceremony. Having been written and the music composed by citizens of the city.

On motion the meeting adjourned into a committee on supply.

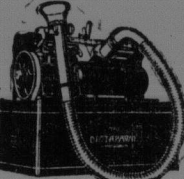

St. John Lodge No. 30 K. of P. Officers Were Installed Last Night—List of Officers for the Next Term.

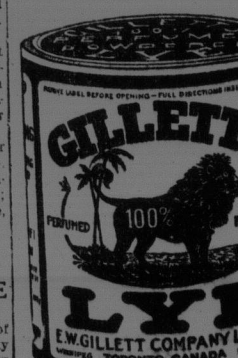
