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SALED CHESTNUTS. Chestnuts, olive oil, salt. Select, large-sized chestnuts. Remove the outer shells with sharp knife, scrub clean by pouring boiling water over them; after which the inner skin can easily be rubbed off. Cook until tender in slightly salted boiling water. Drain, dry and place in a baking pan with a little olive oil - about a tablespoonful to a pound of chestnuts. Toss them about so that the oil is evenly distributed, sprinkle with salt and place in the oven for ten or fifteen minutes so as to brown the nuts slightly. - Pictorial Review.
