MARCH 29TH, 1900.

APRIL, 1900.

In order to insure the sum needed for Mrs. Rutherford's travelling fund to Edinburgh, it was decided that, as Ontario's share would be \$75.00—that being half of the whole amount required—we stand ready to use provincial funds up to the sum of \$50.00 to, if necessary, augment local contributions.

AUGUST 24TH, 1900.

The Perth County President having been suddenly summoned to Manitoba, leaving the County work and Annual Meeting unprovided for, it was decided to ask Miss Wiggins to attend the Convention, taking her travelling expenses from the collections.

AUGUST 27TH, 1900.

Mrs. Rounds, of Chicago, chosen as Convention speaker. Subsequent enquiries raised the objection of expense, and it was decided to look for some one else.

AUGUST 28TH, 1900.

The dates for Convention were voted upon and placed at the usual time—October 29th to November 3rd.

AUGUST 31ST, 1900.

It was unanimously voted to invite our Dominion President, Mrs. Rutherford, to meet with us at Provincial Convention and be one of the speakers at the Tuesday night meeting.

SEPTEMBER 10TH, 1900.

Mrs. Brownell, as late Superintendent Prison Work, was asked to be present at the Charities and Correction Conference (to be held September 27th) and to take with her two other Toronto ladies, the three to represent the Ontario W. C. T. U.
