POTATOES AND BEANS
 Quotations for potatoes have not changed for the last two weeks. The market according to quality and season is easier, sheep being quoted at \$4 to \$5 a cwt. and lambs at \$4 to \$7 each. Calves are quoted for forward freely, and prices ruled low at \$2 to \$5 each.

MONTREAL HOG MARKET
 Montreal, Saturday, May 13.—A stronger feeling developed in the market here for live hogs this week, and prices advanced 25c to 50c over those current a week ago, due to the small supplies and the demand from the packers. The price of selected lots being made at \$6.75 to \$7.25 a cwt. weighed off cars. It is doubtful if these prices will be maintained, as the Western markets this week are ruling considerably lower. The market for dressed hogs is also closing firmer, with fresh killed abattoir stock quoted at \$9.50 to \$9.75 a cwt.

EXPORT BUTTER AND CHEESE
 Montreal, Saturday, May 13.—The market for cheese opened firm with prices unchanged from those current last week, and quotations for Camembert and Stirling selling at 11½¢ to 11½¢ a lb., but cable advices were decidedly weaker towards the middle of the week. A number of orders were coming at these prices limited to the buyers in the country were reduced, and towards the end of the week the offerings in the country were being bought up at 11½¢ to 11½¢, and even at these prices buyers were not anxious for more. There is no perceptible increase in the demand at the decline, and unless orders begin to come in early in the week we may continue to expect sales at lower prices next week, the downward movement being bound to continue until the demand for export comes in on sufficient volume to absorb the receipts from the factories. The shipments last week were about 1,100 tons, a very small shipment indeed for this time of the year. The receipts amounted to 15,000 cases, a decrease from the corresponding week last year instead of the increase which was confidently expected. Advances from all sections of the country would indicate an average market, and there is no doubt that the receipts after this will be more on a parity.

CONDITIONS ON THE HORSE MARKET
 Conditions on the horse market remain unchanged—a fair demand, but little improvement. Quotations are as follows: Good heavy drafters, \$250 to \$300; medium weight, \$150 to \$200. Good agricultural horses, bring \$125 to \$200 and fair quality ones \$100 to \$150. Express horses are quoted \$170 to \$200; drivers, \$150 to \$200; and saddlers, \$150 to \$200.

LIVE STOCK
 Live stock markets opened with a snap a week ago today. Consignments were fairly large and were cleaned up in good time. Top prices were fully 10 cents higher than the Montreal previous, and heavy export cattle sold well under increasing cables from the Old Country. Most of the export stock was of the splendid quality. A feature of the trade was the selling of 15 loads of Michigan steers at an average price of \$6.10. The demand for export cattle is also good, buyers being present from outside points. Firm prices on live deliveries is the whole story at this time, and the price is concerned. It is a general belief that had deliveries been at all liberal prices would not have been maintained. At the last market, only a few loads were sold at \$6.05 to \$6.10, but the general price for heavy was \$5.80 to \$6. The pleasing feature of the cattle market is the steady local demand. Drovers have no fear of a good market for their stock, and the country cannot be said for the export trade. Apparently Old Country prices cannot be depended upon. The market there lacks permanence and cables report widely varying prices. The demand for stockers is good, but none are offered. As high as \$5.85 has been offered for good steep steers. Quotations at the close of the week were: Export cattle, choice \$5 to \$6.15; good, \$5.70 to \$5.85; bulls, \$5 to \$5.15; butcher cattle, choice \$5 to \$6.15; good, \$5.70 to \$5.85; common, \$4.75 to \$5.15; butcher cows, choice \$4.75 to \$5.80; common to medium, \$4.25 to \$5.15; feeders, \$3.25 to \$4.75; stockers, \$4.25 to \$5.25; canners, \$2.25 to \$2.75.

Trade in milk cows is not so brisk as it was a few days ago. There is a fair demand for first class calves, but inferiors are not wanted. Milkers, choice, \$60 to \$85; common to medium, \$30 to \$50; springers, \$25 to \$60. Lack of a steady supply has lessened demand for mutton, and butchers have turned to beef and veal, and they are certain of getting what they want. Ewes are quoted at \$4.75 to \$5.25; bucks and rams, \$5 to \$6.15; yearlings, \$3 to \$5.50; yearling lambs, cwt., \$5.60 to \$6.40. Veal calves are not as plentiful as they were two weeks ago, and prices are firm at \$4 to \$6.50.

During the early part of the week hogs sold at the decline for \$5.75 at country prices. Chicago offered 15 cents, which increased values locally. On the closing market, hogs were selling at \$5.45 at country points, and \$5.15 on the market. At Montreal the cattle market weakened three days, but prices continued steady at the decline. Demand was fairly good, at the close of the week choice steers selling at \$6.25; good, \$5.75 to \$6; fair, \$5.75 to \$5.50; and common, \$5.25 to \$5.00.
