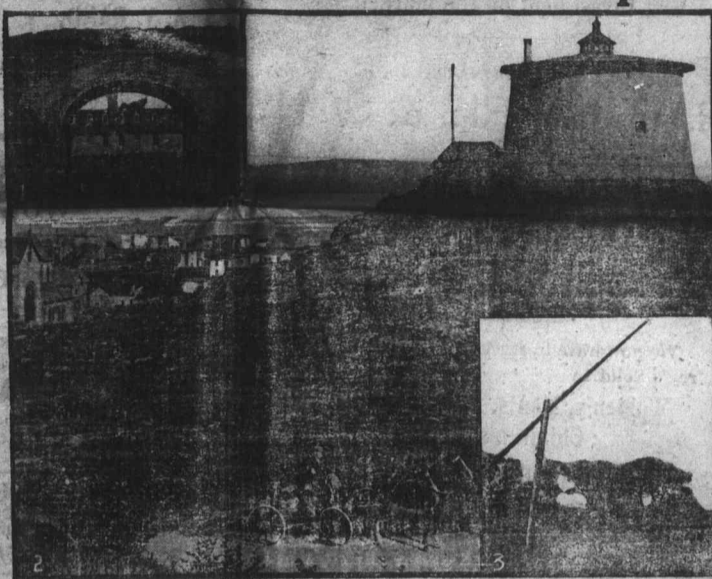

The Food Pledge. Ninety per cent. of the food consumed in Canada passes through the hands of our women. There is, then, a great responsibility resting upon them to conserve supplies needed overseas and to utilize perishable foods. Waste in all its many forms should be regarded not only as a sin but as actual disloyalty in war time. It is important that sufficient and nutritious food should be provided, suited to the needs of the different members of the family.

Germany's Losses. Danish Society for Study of Social Consequences of the War estimates that for three years of this war France's total loss of population is 2,200,000 and that of Germany for the same period 3,700,000. According to the investigation, Germany's population will have decreased from 67,800,000 to 65,500,000 instead of increasing to more than 70,200,000 as it would have done under normal conditions.

After the War, What? Already statements and political economists are seriously considering the momentous issues which must follow the ending of the war. The Contemporary Review says: 'At the close of the war what the various Governments will be faced with will not be opportunities of enriching themselves at the cost of their enemies, but the imminent danger of famine, in one country or another, with a calamitous deficiency of some of the principal foodstuffs, such as cereals and meat, threatening, quite possibly extensive local starvation with huge deficiencies in most countries in such materials as the metallic ores, coal, timber, hides, oil, wool, rubber, etc., without which the civil employment of the demobilized millions can not be resumed, and with such a scarcity of merchant shipping and railway wagons, and such a dilapidation of all the ways of land transport as seriously to aggravate all the shortages of commodities.
