removal of restrictions on federal funding of universities, thus taking into account increased costs because of inflation and growth in student enrolment.

The AUCC also recommends that the Fiscal Arrangements Act be renegotiated for a two-year period ending March 31, 1979, allowing sufficient time for federal-provincial university consultations. Another of the recommendations

is an addition of 35 percent for indirect costs to present grants without any diminution in the number or size of such grants.

As such these are only recommendations proposed by the AUCC and cannot possibly take effect before 1979.
