

AUCC addresses itself to university nationalization

The Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada is now striving to give students mobility and uniformity in a national university system. The AUCC held a press conference at the Lord Beaverbrook hotel last Friday. This mobility may be accomplished by a uniformity of tuition fees across Canada.

"Are we by looking at things province by province, missing out on a national centered institution?" "You don't need a faculty of forestry in every university. You don't even need one in every province," said Dr. Michael Oliver, president of the AUCC, using forestry as an example of his point. "What we do need are centres of excellence in the field."

According to UNB President J.M. Anderson, "this part of the country is leading the rest." Maritime universities collectively respond to the needs of this region, said Anderson. The Maritime Higher Education system was cited by Anderson as an example. Currently members of the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada are presenting concurrent briefs to each of the ten provincial governments concerning a raise in the amount of money granted to secondary education institutes and a general change in the present regionally oriented university system to a national one.

Hatfield showed enough interest in the brief that he will be in attendance at the first major conference to be held by the AUCC in March of this year. Along with the university representatives and AUCC members, student members of the AUCC will also have a voice in the future of Canadian universities. "Ultimately what happens in Universities is a political decision," said Anderson. The AUCC is cited as the means of giving the universities a say in the grant system. It is better to discuss more than just the money side of things, they said. operating expenditures for post secondary education in the prov-

ince in each fiscal year, and b) \$15. per head of 1967 populations (since escalated to \$48.) There is at present a 15 percent ceiling in any increase, posed by the federal government. The AUCC addresses itself to the removal of restrictions on federal funding of universities, thus taking into account increased costs because of inflation and growth in student enrolment. The AUCC also recommends that the Fiscal Arrangements Act be renegotiated for a two-year period ending March 31, 1979, allowing sufficient time for federal-provincial university consultations. Another of the recommendations is an addition of 35 percent for indirect costs to present grants without any diminution in the number or size of such grants. As such these are only recommendations proposed by the AUCC and cannot possibly take effect before 1979.

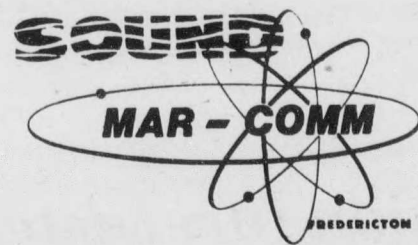
