Dineen Memorial Lecture to be held at UNB

This year's Dineen Memorial Lecturer at the University of New Brunswick will give three free public

talks on the importance of software engineering in telecommunications.

Peter Cashin, assistant vice-president of computing research at Bell Northern Research, will deliver the memorial lecture on both the Fredericton and Saint John campuses of UNB. Entitled Computing: The Foundation of Telecommunications, this lecture will be given in Fredericton on Wednesday, April 10, at 8 pm. in the Dineen Auditorium, Head Hall, and in Saint John on Thursday, April 11, at 8 pm in the Hazen Hall Lecture Theatre.

On April 10, Dr. Cashin will also present a technical lecture, Software Technology Trends, at 2:30 pm in the Dineen Auditorium at UNB in Fredericton.

A New Zealand native, Dr. Cashin holds a PhD in electrical engineering from the University of Canterbury. Among his accomplishments at Bell Northern are the design and development of the

Canterbury. Among his accomplishments at Bell Northern are the design and development of the Norstar key telephone system.

The Dineen Memorial Lecture Series, which began in 1980, honors former engineering professor and UNB president James Dineen. It is sponsored by the university, the faculty of engineering and the Associated Alumni of UNB. This year's lectures are also the final event of Computer Science Days-a series of free public lectures to mark the founding of the first faculty of computer science in Canada at UNB.

There are few topics at the meeting to be discussed, the most important of these issues will be the new AUS constitution which will effect all the Arts Faculty student groups.

As I stated at our first meeting in October, my main objective for the AUS was to bring a greater degree of cohesiveness to the Arts Faculty. Throughout the year the AUS has attempted to reach this goal with events such as the Arts Undergraduate Wine & Cheese and the Arts Cabaret. The new AUS constitution will also be a part of this process with the formation of the Arts Undergraduate Council (AUC).

The AUC would be a body formed from different student groups and the Dean's office to voice student concerns, coordinate student affairs, to help all the clubs and societies to function more

Some of our societies have voiced concerns about the degree of control the AUS would have over their respective groups. When you read the enclosed constitution, you will notice their is no control over your respective budgets. This means that each club or society would have complete control over its money and the running of its group. All the AUS will ask for is a degree of participation within the Arts Undergraduate Council.

Please read over the proposed AUS constitution and at the meeting on April 4 please voice any concerns you might have with the document.. If you disagree with the proposed constitution tell us, make your views heard. Changes to the constitution can be made at the meeting, and only with a vote by the clubs and societies involved in the document will allow it to be implemented.
