might be completed before the close of the

year. It was further provided that after the dissolution of the Commission the Superintendents of Indian Offairs in their respective localities should apportion as soon as practicable all the lands re-- maning unalloted or unreserved by the present Commission, such apportion. - ment to be subject to the approval of the Chief Commissioner of Lands and Horls of British Columbia acting on behalf of the Local Government, and in the event of any difference between the Superintendents and the Chief Commis - sioner as to the extent or locality of the lands to be alloted, the matter might be referred to one of the judges of the Supreme Court of that Province whose decision should be final.

In the month of Sune last the Commissioners were dispatched from Sictoria when up that time they had been employed, into the Interior in consequence of reports having reached the Department that great uneasiness and discontent prevailed among the Indian Tribes in the neighborhood of lamboops, and that the white settlers were apprehensive of a general rising in the tribes. It was consequently thought
