

with the approval of the
 Commissioners of Lands and
 Works to the Kitchikan Indians.
 The Indian Reserve when as-
 signed to the Indians by treaty
 or otherwise in any Province
 of the Dominion or in the
 N. W. T. has always been held
 to carry with it not only the
 Land in but all trees, wood,
 timber stone, minerals and
 other valuables, in or upon
 the Land, and by the interpo-
 lation clause of the Indian
 Act sec. 2 (1) it is evident that
 such is the meaning to be attached
 to the term "Reserve" when employed
 in the Act.
