

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

MR. BALLS: I don't know if it has been gone over recently.
Do you know if the Indians are using water from there?

MR. BALL: Yes, they are using the water.

MR. ELLIS: There seems to be a plentiful supply.

MR. BALLS: Yes.

MR. BALL: I doubt if anybody else could get water out of there
at any other place.

MR. ALEXANDER: The Indians are living on the Reserve.

MR. BALL: No, they are living off it on the other side of the
river and are using a cable.

MR. ALEXANDER: Because I notice the late Indian Commission re-
commended that that Reserve be cut off. Do you know
the reason for cutting it off?

MR. BALL: No.

MR. BALLS: You think that Reserve will be retained?

MR. BALL: I think it will be retained.

MR. ALEXANDER: And they are diverting water from Wolf Creek.
The plan does not show any intake.

MR. BALLS: Do you know about where they are diverting water?
This is Wolf Lake and here is Wolf Creek.

MR. BALL: They have a ditch right in there about 100 yards
below the outlet of the lake.

MR. ALEXANDER: Would you mark on our plan?

MR. ELLIS: That is approximate.

MR. BALLS: Upper Similkameen, Number 4, 9-Mile Creek. Provin-
cial record dated January 30th, 1897, for 30 inches
of water from 9-Mile Creek.
