knolls and well-kept lawns until, having gone through Strath Gowan's glen, it finds its way between the hills and into the Don River.

It is at this point one is struck with the remarkably English character of the scene, in which it bears a distinct resemblance to the unrivaled beauty of the grounds of the Rosedale Golf Club which lie considerably to the north. The broad ravine has for many years been divided into grazing paddocks. Their close-clipped green sward sets out the foliage of the trees of mature, sturdy growth that grace the landscape. To the south the land rises gently, running on this hand to a thick wood, splendid in variegated colorings, and on that, over the hill and out across country.
