THE NEW GOVERNOR.

Mr. William Mortimer Clark, K. C., who was sworn in on Tuesday as Lieut.-Governor of the Province of Ontario, is a native of Aberdeen, Scotland, where he was born May 24, 1836. Thus he celebrates his birthday anniversary on Victoria Day. He is a son of the late John Clark, founder of the Caledonian bank, Scotland, . He studied law at Edinburgh University, came to Canada in 1856, and was called to the Ontario bar in 1861. He was created a Q. C. by the Ontario Government in 1887. Since 1880 he has been chairman of the Board of Management of Knox College, Toronto. He is a senator of Toronto University and is identified with the Home for Incurables. Canadian Institute. St. Andrew's Society, and other fraternal and benevolent bodies. Politically, he was a supporter of Dalton McCar-

MAIL DELIVERY.

The decision of the St. Thomas City Council to petition the Dominion Government for a postal delivery is wise, the Journal of that place contends. "Such a request from St. Thomas is well within the bounds of reason.

It is no hardship for business men to call at the postoffice for their mail, argues the Journal, but for those citizens whose business does not lie in that direction and who must make a special visit, the specialty of a daily enquiry is a nuisance and an inconvenience. It would not be so bad if one had any means of knowing when there was a letter, but in order to avoid leaving mail in the office for an indefinite period a daily visit is necessary Thus the amount of labor involved in the delivery of the mail by each household having its own postman is probably one hundred times greater than if a couple of postmen were employed. It is one of those services that can be rendered so much more cheaply and satisfactorily by employes of the Government that is is surprising the Postoffice Department would hesitate for a moment to incur the small expenditure necessary. The argument against it is that other cities of like size would make similar demands. Well, why not? Why should not Brantford, Stratford, Chatham and Guelph, and St. Thomas have postmen as well as Toronto and Hamilton.

The Journal believes that one thousand dollars a year would pay the cost of a daily delivery in St. Thomas, and it would be worth that to the service in having the mail. matter distributed expeditiously Here is a matter which might well be considered in regard to Chatham.

Savage Swamp Dwellers Found

The Acting Administrator of New Guinea, Sir Francis P. Winter, in a report to the Governor-General of the Australian Commonwealth, describes a curious people who live in the swamps in New Guinea.

They are called the Ahgaiambo, and have lived in swamps for a period which goes back beyond native tradition. They dwell in houses raised on piles about 12 feet above the

ed on piles about 12 feet above the surface of the water, which they traverse in canoes dug out of logs. These they propel standing up with

n pole. In addition, they are expert swimmers, gliding through beds of reeds or over masses of floating vegetable matter with ease. They never leave the morass, and their mode of life has reacted upon their physical char-acter, with the result that they are not able to walk properly on hard ground, their feet bleeding if they try to do so. Sir Francis Winter describes two of

"The man would have been a fair-"The man would have been a lair-sized native, had his body from the hips downward been proportionate to the upper part of his frame. He had a good chest, and, for a native, a thick neck, and his arms matched

his trunk "His feet were short and broad. and very thin and flat, with-for a native—weak-looking toes. This last feature was still more noticeable in the woman, whose toes were long and slight, and stood out rigidly from the foot, as though they pos-sessed no joints. The feet of both the man and the woman seemed to rest on the ground something like wooden feet would do. The skin above the knees of the man was in loose folds, and the sinews and muscles around the knee were not well-developed. The muscles of the

well-developed. The muscles of the shin were much better developed than those of the calf.

"In the ordinary native the skin on the loins is smooth and tight, and the anatomy of the body is clearly discernible; but the Ahgaiambo man had several folds of thick skin or muscle across the loins which concealed the outline of his frame. On placing one of our negrous frame. On placing one of our natives of the same height alongside the marsh man, we forticed that our native was about 3 inches higher at the hips.
