IMPROVE THE GATES AT MARKET ST. CROSSING

Grand Trunk Official Confers With City Engineer Jones To-day.

Mr. W. R. Davidson, superintendent of the London Division of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, was in the city this morning and met City Engineer Jones and Overseer Howie in reference to the gates at the West St. crossing, which are being reconstructed and about which complaint had been made to them by Mr. Jones. The ground was gone over carefully and each objection explained to Mr. Davidson, who in turn promised that the roadway would be planked the full width of the street, the work to commence as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

This will be a great improvement as the roadway at present is only planked for thirty feet. In reference to the widening of the gates, Mr. Davidson promised to send an engineer to look into the matter and he is to let the city know whether this will be carried out. The present width between the gates is forty-four feet but on account of projecting bars only about 30 feet is available for roadway. The location of the western base of the gate was pointed out by Engineer Jones as being objectionable, it narrowing Wilkins street at the Walsh coal yards to about 22 feet. This could be improved by moving the base of the westerly gate to the north side of the track about fifteen feet west of this point.

OFFERED MAN JOB AT BRANTFORD Labor Bureau Men at Hamilton Charged in Police Court.

(Hamilton Spectator) Stewart & Webb, proprietors of the Ontario employment bureau, were in the police court again this morning, the charge against them this time being laid by James Livens. According to Livens' story in the box, he went to the employment office on Monday of last week and left a dollar for which he was given a receipt and told to come back on the following Wednesday for his job. He called and was asked how he would like a hotel job in Brantford at \$15 a month. He said he would take it in a pinch, but preferred something here. He was told to call back and did so several times only to find a notice on the door saying, "Will be back at two o'clock. He managed to see one of them at last and was told to come back last Monday and get either his money or a job. He did and was put up, he said, until yesterday, when he was given neither his money nor a job. He took the matter to the court.

C. W. Bell, who represented the defendants, was in the midst of his cross-examination of Livens when the magistrate cut the case short and ordered Webb to pay Livens back his dollar. Both Webb and Stewart started to leave the court room when the magistrate called them back.

"Pay the man right here or the case will have to go on," said his worship. "What about the receipt?" asked Webb. "Never mind that, pay him now." Mr. Webb pulled out a bundle of greenbacks from which he peeled off one and handed it to Livens.

Debate on Graft Starts To-day

(By Special Wire to The Courier) QUEBEC, Feb. 13.—The debate on the report of the lower house committee, which found J. O. Mousseau guilty of receiving bribes, will most likely start this morning. There is a difference of opinion among the members regarding the procedure. The opposition want the debate adjourned until copies of all the evidence have been printed and circulated among the members. This means the translating of over six hundred pages of English evidence into French and vice versa, as well as the setting up into type. The government consider this means an unnecessary delay and expense, but in order to meet the opposition half way they have had printed the report of the investigation committee and with this in the hands of each individual member this afternoon, Mr. Taschereau argues that he is justified in opening the debate at once. If this is not done there is every probability of the House continuing in session for another fortnight.

The speech from the Premier, Sir Lomer Gouin, on the subject of the graft report is eagerly expected.

King George a Hard Worker

LONDON, Feb. 13.—King George to-day told Prebendary Wilson Carlile, head of the Church Army, that he was a great believer in hard work.

"I have worked hard myself and I think it is good for people." His Majesty's remark was made during an audience granted to Mr. Carlile at Buckingham Palace. The King also expressed his strong disapproval of indiscriminate charity, saying he considered voluntary agencies such as the church army, far better able to help back-sliders and unfortunate people back to good citizenship.

As Mr. Carlile was entering the palace he was accosted by a former pickpocket who had been reclaimed by the church army and who sent a message to the King saying he had lived honestly since the day of King Edward's coronation. He had stolen thirty-two watches and purses. He now had he said \$840 in the savings bank.

His Lordship, Bishop Williams of Huron, conducted confirmation service in Grace Church last night before a large gathering. Sixteen candidates were received into church membership in the usual solemn ceremony of the laying on of hands by the Bishop, who imparts his blessing upon those who come forward prepared for the obligations resting upon them in their receiving all the privileges and rights of church membership. As usual, his Lordship's confirmation address was most inspiring and uplifting, not only to those confirmed, but to the congregation present.
