## WAREHOUSE BURNED

### Twenty Thousand Dollar Blaze

### The Heaviest Losers Are Carrol & Sawyer and T. G. Wilson.

All the eggs in Dawson, upwards of 500 cases, were most effectually cornered last night by a fire which destroyed the corrugated iron warehouse owned by T. G. Wilson, located at the corner of Third avenue and Queen streets and leased and occupied by Carroll & Sawyer, transient traders, who in addition to their own stock had large consignments stored in the warehouse for others.

Evidently the fire started some time before 1 o'clock this morning when it was discovered by Constable Taylor who chanced to be passing shortly after 1 it had made considerable headway that nearly the entire interior of the building was ablaze and inside of half an hour damage to the amount of from \$18,000 to \$20,000 had been wrought. The constable immediately turned in a fire alarm but for some reason it was fully fifteen minutes before a stream of water was turned on and when the second stream began to play there was no nozzle on the hose and another delay was occasioned. As the flames did not delay on account of tardiness on the part of the department the building and its contents were practically consumed, except for a few tons of potatoes which were half roasted, and about all there was for the department to do was to protect some hay piled out in front. T. G. Wilson's big brick warehouse which stood immediately adjoining the burning building, protected itself where, had it been a wooden structure, human effort would not have saved it.

Of the more than 500 cases of eggs destroyed Carroll and Sawyer owned 300 cases which, in addition to oranges, lemons, potatoes and hay lost, makes a total loss sustained by them of fully \$10,000. The next heaviest loser is T. G. Wilson, owner of the building, which is a total loss. It was erected three years ago at a cost of \$5,400. Other transient traders had goods to the value of from \$3,000 to \$5,000 stored in the building all of which were lost. Neither the building or any of the contents were insured.

The origin of the fire is a mystery some men were employed in the warehouse during the day at candle-

## TWO JURY TRIALS ON

### Suit on Balance Due on \$5,000 Note

Other is for \$10,000 Damages Alleged to Have Caused by Tailings.

Both the departments of the territorial court today are occupied in hearing civil cases by jury. Before Mr. Justice Dugas is the case of McArthur vs Chisholm, an action to recover the balance of a \$5,000 loan made by the plaintiff to defendant amounting to nearly \$2,900. The onus being upon the defendant to show cause why he should not pay the balance of the note he this forenoon was engaged in presenting his side of the case. The jury consists of J. A. Chute, J. A. Bruce, George McLeod, Ben Levy, James Purden and Thos. Bond. The defendant was the first on the stand, testifying in his own behalf and undergoing an extensive cross examination at the hands of counsel for the plaintiff. Andrew McKenzie followed and at the hour of adjourning for luncheon there were still several witnesses to go in the box.

## JURY'S VERDICT

### Found for the Plaintiff in Sum of \$9,000 and Costs

The jury in the case of the Bank of B. N. A. vs La France which occupied two days in its hearing, did not retire until a late hour yesterday afternoon and it was about a half hour before they had arrived at a verdict. On their return to the court room through their foreman, A. J. Bannerman, it was announced that a verdict had been agreed upon. The findings were in favor of the plaintiff to whom judgment was awarded in the sum of \$9,000 and costs, the amount of the note sued upon. The question of interest was reserved for the time being. The note called for interest at the rate of eighteen per cent. per annum but before the trial was begun that rate was abandoned and the plaintiff signified its willingness to accept seven per cent. the rate allowed under the banking act. This the defendant refuses to pay, contending that if the rate of eighteen per cent. is illegal the bank has no right of its own accord to make another rate, and certainly at no greater rate than five per cent. which is the legal rate. His lordship will decide the question later.
