THE CRISIS

By Winston Churchill, Author of "Richard Carvel"—Paper 75c; Cloth \$1.23—The Copp, Clark Company Limited, Publishers, Toronto.

When we have read a book which charmed us and charmed thousands besides us, as did "Richard Carvel," it is with a feeling of hesitation, almost of fear, that we approach a new book by the same author. We dread a disappointment.

But "The Crisis" has come; "The Crisis" has been read, and "The Crisis" has stood the severe test of following a book so marvellously popular as "Richard Carvel."

This new novel strikes as spell-bound. It is wonderful—more perfect than "Richard Carvel." Winston Churchill is a literary aristocrat. In his work we find no sickly melodramas of unattractive loves or morbid scenes borrowed from tragedy; but throughout the story is wholesome and sweet. There is a little sadness, a little villainy, but only enough to make the end seem better and happier by the contrast.

Virginia Carvel, the heroine, is a charming girl—not perfect, a bit willful, a bit faulty; but, all the more lovable for that, perhaps, because we feel she is not then unattainable. She was tall, graceful and altogether beautiful; and when Stephen Regie (an important figure in the story) first saw her, it was at a slave auction. She wore a long Talma of crimson cashmere, and her face was in that most seductive of frames, a scoop bonnet of dark green velvet. For a fleeting second her eyes met his, and then her lashes fell. But he was aware, when he had turned away, that she was looking at him again. He grew uneasy. He wondered whether his appearance betrayed his purpose, or made a question of his sanity. Sanity? Yes, probably he was in-

greatest trouble in undoing the work that has been done. In the past it has been the custom to grade the roads up to the catch basins. The result was that the catch basins were left high up, while the space between was just a hole for the water to lie in. Now the men with the scraper pick out the catch basin first of all and then grade the gutter down to the basins.

Dynamite Alley has been scraped and the gutters cleared out. Engineer Chambers is doing well and is handling the steam roller well.

The Engineer says that the Board of works are considering the purchase of \$5,000 worth of rubble stone and gravel to make good roads in Chatham. The only road that can be made cheaply and that will do the work is macadam made in that way. The road is graded up and trenched on both sides. Then the roadbed is dug out and filled in with rubble stone and covered with fine gravel. The road is then rolled and packed tight. This must be done when the road is dry and before the wet weather comes. The road must be compact with the roller. The water will then run off and the roads will always be good. There is about 100,000 feet of roadway in the city, which the Board of Works are thinking of treating this way.

"There is no use simply filling in the mud holes in the street. My idea is," said the Engineer, "to dig out the mud and fill in with rubble and dry earth."

"The roller saves \$25 per day."

DOVER COUNCIL

The council met June 17th. The members were all present. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted.

Mr. Crawford reported verbally re Henry Gillet's grievance, referred to him.

The Reeve reported having settled with Solomon Zebbs, on the Mechanical drain at \$11, and also reported having paid James Grant \$12.68, Chatham City Council having paid Mr. Grant an equal sum for four sheep and two lambs damaged by dogs.

A notice was read from James stating that the bridge on the 13th concession over Little Bear Creek is unsafe for public travel.

The matter of the petition of Anthony Harris and others in reference to the 5th concession road west of the Ticky Tacky Line, was taken up and considered, and the council is of the opinion that it is more of a drainage matter than a bridge one. The road would require an outlet before a useful road could be made.

Moved by Wright and Wright, that the Treasurer be instructed to credit the bridge on the 13th concession over Little Bear Creek with \$20, and charge to general account.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Grant, that the grievance of James Wemp, re bridge on the 13th concession over Little Bear Creek be referred to the Reeve and Mr. Crawford and report.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Trudell, that Joseph Cloutie be paid \$20 for two lambs killed by dogs, being two-thirds value, as per certificate of the inspector.—Carried.

Moved by Trudell and Crawford, that James Wemp be paid 75 cents for one-half day inspecting sheep killed by dogs.—Carried.

Moves by Wright and Trudell, that Stanislas Gorvoss, assessor, be paid \$4.00 each for equalizing the assessments of union school sections 6 and 15, Raleigh and Dover, and Chatham and Dover, along with the assessors of said towns.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Trudell, that John Stewart's grievance re statute labor be referred to the commissioner of the fourth division, with power.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Trudell, that the different matters now under consideration be referred to the Reeve and Mr. Crawford and report.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Grant, that the Reeve and Clerk be appointed to ask for tenders from the Banner and Planet offices for the printing of the voters' lists, and the clerk to read the proofs.—Carried.

Moved by Wright and Crawford, that the Reeve and Mr. Trudell be appointed to attend to the matter of two bridges over the Rivard drain at the 5th concession, and the bridge over Dolson's Creek, on the River Road, with power and report.—Carried.

Small accounts amounting to \$20.50 were ordered paid.—Carried.

The council adjourned.
