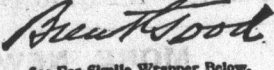

INTERNATIONAL S. S. LESSON

FOR TO-MORROW.
 Easter Lesson—I. Cor., 15, 12-21,
 55-58.

Golden Text—"Now is Christ risen
 from the dead, and become the first
 fruits of them that are asleep."

From the 12th to the 20th verses
 of our lesson, Paul describes the pit-
 iable condition we were in had our
 Lord Jesus Christ been only a man,
 and died in similar conditions of hu-
 man weakness to our own, and with
 no power to conquer death. Were
 it so he never would have written
 "As in Adam all died, so in Christ
 shall all be made alive." Man loses
 the life of his body through sin, and
 all men have the life of their bodies
 restored by Christ.

Paul is inspired to tell us every
 member of Adam's family gets resur-
 rection and endless existence whe-
 ther he will or he won't. Whether
 this will be eternal life or "eternal
 destruction from the face of the
 Lord and from the glory of His
 might," is conditional upon what
 man has done with that Jesus, who
 shall call him from the tomb.

To go out of life because we must
 is misery, to go out because our wills
 accept the necessity as the will of
 God, is victory. The one is death in-
 deed, the latter is the life of enter-
 ing and being entered by a larger
 life; we are only following our Lord
 within the veil where our forerun-
 ner hath for us entered, who said,
 "He that followeth me shall not
 walk in darkness." What a bless-
 edness to have Him with us in spir-
 it, when the stillness and loneliness
 of death, parts us from all other
 friends but Himself. He is but giv-
 ing us an experience like His own
 on Calvary. "Father, into thy hands
 I commend my spirit"; or like mar-
 tyred Stephen, "Lord Jesus, receive
 my spirit."

Our spirits reach out—as a babe
 for its mother's bosom—to be "safe
 in the arms of Jesus"; not to be in
 earth's cold clay or ocean's depths,
 but to be closer to Him than ever
 before, for we know whom we have
 believed, and it is He who hath
 made us ready—as He did the dying
 thief—for the paradise of God.
 Death, after all, is but sowing the
 seed for a great harvest of life,
 when all men shall awake, some to
 everlasting life, and some to shame
 and everlasting contempt. But
 thanks be to God who giveth us the
 victory, through our risen Lord; vic-
 tory for steadfast, immovable, and
 abounding work.
