

The matter under consideration was The matter under consideration was the fixing of prices to be charged consumers of natural gas in Chat-ham, and the question was debated for nearly three hours before an agreement was arrived at. A resolu-tion was finally drawn up and passed in committee, which in effect was as follows:

That the city give the privilege of opening up the streets on condition that natural gas be supplied to consumers at the following rates:

To consumers who use gas all year around for heating purposes, and, if desired, for heating and cooking purposes in connection, 25 cents per thousand feet all year around.

To consumers who use gas for cither illuminating or cooking purposes, or for both purposes combined, 35 cents per thousand feet all year around.

To manufacturers using 250,000 feet or more per month, 15 cents per thousand feet.


