The iff will be the main question on ch both parties will appeal to the ry, the money question being with the defeat of Bryan four years ago. President Roosevelt will be nominated by acclamation, there being no opposition to him in the Republican party. While the presiident may not be the unanimous shoice of the would-be political lead-

ers, the great backing of the party. the men who have no axes to grind but are devoted to Republican principles, long ago served notice that Teddy" must be his own successor Since 1861 the Republican party has had control elmost continuously, the exception being eight years of President Cleveland's administration. The Republican party began its existence with the protective policy, when Senator Morrill, of Maine, introduced his fariff bill in 1861. By closely following in the line of protection the Americans have become the greatest manufacturing nation in the world, and grown from a population of 25,000,000 in substantially free trade days till it now has a population of 70,000,000. By its protection of American labor workmen have enjoyed high wages and unlimited prosperity. Now and then in the history of the past 44 years there have been depressions in business, but they can be laid mainly to the charge of over speculation rather than to over production. Because it has stood loyally to the protective principle the Re publican party has been kept allost continuously in power. Wilson tariff in President Cleveland's administration was a warning to labor what might be expected if the Democratic party came into power. That there will be no tampering with the tariff in the Chicago convention is settled, nor will that twin fallacy of free trade, reciprocity, have even a corporal's guard to endorse it. So long as the Republican party maintains its high standards in tariff and finance will it deserve and win the confidence of the intelligent men who are the mainstay of the country. That President Roosevelt will be his own successor as head of the great American Government for the next four years is substantially admitted by many of the leaders of the Democratic party.—Hamilton Spectator.
