## GERMANS ROUND UP AND SHOOT POLES

Warsaw, Russian Poland, Jan. 5.—Many Poles, men of military age and members of the civil militia who were excused for one reason or another from service with the Russian army, have been sent from Lodz into Germany as prisoners of war since the German occupation of that city. A Pole, who escaped from Lodz and came to Warsaw said that 19 of these men who failed to comply with the German order to report at the military headquarters have been rounded up and shot. This man said also that the Germans have confiscated stores and provisions and that consequently there is much suffering from hunger among the Poles.

### Election of School Trustees

Public Notice is hereby given to the Electors of the Municipality of Nanaimo, that I require the presence of said electors at the City Police Court House on the 11th day of January, 1915, from 12 noon to 2 p.m., for the purpose of electing three (3) persons as members of the Board of Trustees for Nanaimo City School District.

Any person being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, and having been for the six months next preceding the date of nomination the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City School District of the assessed value of the last Municipal Assessment Roll of five hundred dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and being otherwise qualified to vote at an election of School Trustees in the said School District shall be eligible to be elected or to serve as a School Trustee in such School District.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:  
The candidates shall be nominated in writing, the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of the notice and 2 p.m. of the day of the nomination and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 14th day of January, 1915, at the City Police Court, aforesaid, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. at which time and place each elector who is duly qualified to vote for Mayor will be entitled to his vote for three (3) candidates for members of the Board of School Trustees, but may only cast one vote for any such candidate, of which every person is hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

C., Jan. 5.—Baron Zwiadine, counsellor of the Austrian embassy, informed the state department today that Austrian prisoners of war in Siberia were reported to be receiving food only every other day and that many were suffering from cold. The United States has brought the plight of the prisoners to the attention of the Russian government, but the Austrian embassy made a relief committee composed in part of American missionaries left Peking today for Siberia with medical and other supplies.

## WET WEATHER ON SALISBURY PLAINS

London, Jan. 6.—Several thousand members of the Canadian contingent after enduring many weeks on Salisbury Plain of some of the roughest and wettest weather remembered at this time of the year, have now gone into billets in towns and villages around the plain.

Devises is now the headquarters of the artillery and the town accommo-

dates some 900 men and 750 horses, while other brigades with ammunition columns and horse artillery, some three or four thousand men and their horses are distributed over all the villages and hamlets around. This has caused great pressure, not only on house and cottage accommodation, also on farm buildings, but there has been loyal co-operation between the military and civil elements the Canadians having won many friends since their arrival.

One of the buildings requisitioned is the famous agricultural school at West Lavington where three hundred

men and a dozen officers are billeted. The brigade allotted to Devises arrived yesterday and both men and horses bore witness to the extraordinary muddy conditions in the neighborhood. The Canadians have borne themselves all through with cheerfulness.

There are interesting statements as to the Canadians' departure shortly for France, but they may not be published yet.

The river at Salisbury rose to such a height early yesterday that the cathedral was flooded. Late Monday night though the water had risen to the west entrance of the cathedral, the building itself was free, but at 4 o'clock the floors of the cloisters and chapter house were awash. The water rose steadily until seven inches were recorded in the body of the building. Torrents of water rushed through the ground floors of the houses on the south side of the cathedral.

In the district of Amesbury a member of the Canadian contingent becoming separated from his comrades on Monday night fell into the river near Counters bridge and was swept away. His body has not been recovered.
