GERMANS ROUND UP

Warsaw, Russian Poland, Jan. 5. Many Poles, men of military age and members of the civil militia who were excused for one reason or another from service with the Russian army, have been sent from Lodz into dermany as prisoners of war since the German occupation of that city.
