C. P. R. STRIKE.

Two Multitude Men Under Trial Here for Interference.

The trial of section men Thomas Kennedy and Edward Appleby, charged with interfering with the maintenance of the C. P. R., was begun before Police Magistrate Marsh this morning. Mr. A. J. Gregory appearing for the Company and Mr. Harry, R. C. for the defence. Trackmaster Andrew Acton was on the stand all the morning. The trial is an outcome of the trackmen's strike. The C. P. R. brought a number of men from Madawaska to take the place of the strikers and it is charged that Kennedy and Appleby induced some of the men to return to their homes. They were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Hawthorne and are under bail.

Improvements at the U. N. B.

In addition to a large amount of local work in his line, plumber Denis Shea has several large contracts on hand. In competition with St. John and other outside parties, Mr. Shea has just been awarded a \$3,000 contract for work at the University of New Brunswick. The work to be done includes the building of a reservoir on the hill back of the college and leading the water into the building. The reservoir is to be of stone brick and cement and to have a capacity of 10,000 gallons of water and will be supplied from a never failing spring located 150 feet higher up the hill and the reservoir will be 150 feet above the college roof, giving ample water pressure. A hot water heating plant is to be installed in the residence and hot air furnace put in for heating the college. Bath and toilet rooms are also to be fitted up in the residence.

Mr. Shea is also engaged in fitting up a bath room at Major McDougall's quarters at the barracks and is doing the plumbing at Dr. Harbour's residence now building and at the new wing at Victoria Hospital. He also has the contract for installing a hot water heating plant at the store and residence of C. M. Sherwood at Centerville, Carleton County.
