St. Catharines, June 22.—Charles trooker, of Grantham, found a body St. Catharines, June 22.—Charles Brooker, of Grantham, found a body which had washed ashore on the beach of Lake Ontario near the city yesteriay. The body is that of a man 5 feet 11 inches in height, weighing about 160 pounds. It had the appearance of being in the water for about three weeks, and probably had been over Niagara Falis. The head was totally void of hair, and practically all the clothing was missing. A necktie remained about the neck, beneath which was the only portion of hair on the body. In the tie was a gold stickpin of sword design, set with pearls. On one foot remained a sock of good quality. There were two scalp wounds on the head. The deceased was undoubtedly a man well to do. In the upper jaw were eight gold teeth, the fillings being valued at from \$100 to \$150. A very striking mark of identification must be a tattoed design on the right forearm in the form of an angel and harp in four colors, black, red, yellow and green, the work being very artistic. Coroner Goodman decided that an inquest was unnecessary, and the remains were interred in Victoria Lawn Cemetery here.

Montreal Doctors Watch His Bloodless Method.

BOTH PROVED SUCCESSFUL

Club Foot Demonstrated by Noted Austrian System-An-Address the Method He Uses.

Montreal, June 22 .- Dr. Adolf Log

renz, who has won world-wide fame as a surgeon, performed two operaions at the General Hospital here foot. The amphitheatre was crowd ed with about 400 doctors and stu ents, some having come consider able distances. Dr. Lorenz was as

was noticeable. There was a steady manipulation to break down resistance of the bone and tendons, which had acquired a certain form, which would become permanent without the intervention of science. Slowly but surely the resistance was overcome, the bone yielded, and then one heard the distinct clicking sound, which indicated that the bone had been put back into the cavity, which should have been its natural resting place, a cavity which had become small through the discase and non-use. This stage indicated that the operation had been successful. The bone was pressed down into the cavity, and then the thigh bone was placed at right angles to the body, in which place it will remain. There was, after this, careful dressing, there were layers of flannel and fine cloth, and over all a mask of plaster of Paris, which will remain for six months. At the same time it is fully expected that the child will be able to limp about in the course of a few days.

Finally, at 4.25 Mr. St. John rose to continue the debate for the Opposition. He reminded the House that there was "an awful cloud hanging over us," by reason of revelation after revelation of misdeeds and neglect brought home to the Government. The patent inaccuracies in the commissioners' report, he said, were to say the least, significant. The report was unasked for. There must be some reason for it. He submitted that it was to be found in the extreme prejudice in the minds of the commissioners, and many people would have difficulty in distinguishish between that extreme prejudice and political inclinations.
