Made Ample Provision for Handling Smallpox Outbreak.

Dr. R. W. Bell. Inspector of the Provincial Board of Health, who was sent to Oakville to make inquiries in regard to the smallpox outbreak there, told Dr. Roberts, Medical Health Officer, over the long distance 'phone at noon that he had never seen more ample measures taken for the suppression of the disease than the Oakville authorities had taken.
