Dr. R. W. Electric Lighting Important Announcement

From 1st December next, rates for domestic incandescent lighting will be reduced by 23 to 60 per cent. according to consumption—all incandescent renewals being furnished free.

No flat rate contracts will hereafter be made or renewed.

For commercial lighting, meter rate 4 1/2 cents per kilowatt hour, in addition to a fixed charge depending on the size and kind of lamps used.

A kilowatt hour will operate a 16 candle-power incandescent lamp 18 hours.

Domestic incandescent lighting will, exclusive of meter rent of 25 cents per month, cost, according to amount of consumption from 7.65 cents to 5.94 cents per kilowatt hour.

The above applies only to service within the city limits.
