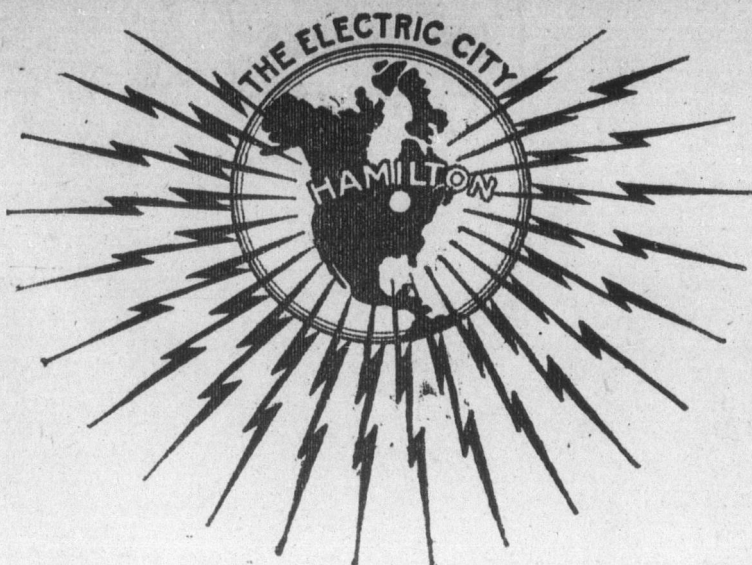

The Times Goes Into the Homes

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a lot of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

RIVERS RISE.

Floods in Colorado Doing Much Damage to Railways.

Grand Junction, Col., June 9.—The flood situation here is serious. Reports from the head waters of Grand and Gunnison Rivers indicate that the floods are just commencing. After remaining stationary all day yesterday the Gunnison River rose rapidly during the night, further threatening the destruction of the municipal pumping plant. Hundreds of men are working to save the costly Redlands dam, which is seriously undermined. Grand River rose twelve feet yesterday and is the highest in fifteen years. The Denver & Rio Grande Railroad is keeping a large force of men on guard protecting its tracks.

All parts of the western slope report considerable damage from floods.
