GEORGETOWN, April 23, 1856.

Arrived here on Sunday in a schooner from Magdalen Islands, Capt. Gill and the crew of the ship Good Intent of Forey of about 500 Tons. This ship left Quebec on the 18th November, and lost her rudder off Gaspe. The Captain endeavored to make and ship a temporary one, which was not found to answer, and the ship became unmanageable, the ship made water very fast, some of her plank having been started with the rudder. On the 2d December came off Brier Island and anchored with 30 fathoms cable, and the crew left and came on land, during the following night they had a heavy gale from the Southwest, and nothing could be seen of the ship in the morning.
