The sixty two vessels comprising the Lunenburg fishing fleet have this year secured 170,425 quintals of fish which have been sold for \$1,539,200 according to a resumof the year's work in the Halfia. Chronicle.

Although it is reported, the ave rage catch this year is larger than last year and conditions are gene rally better, all the catch being a ready sold, and the fishermen nov having the cash, the size of the fleet has been reduced by eighteen (18) vessels. The fleet which numbered 134 boats in 1906 was reduced to 80 in 1923 and to 62 in 1924.

LICENSING OF **ALL PLUMBERS**

Practising in New Brunswick is Obligatory.

Legislation recently published, ef fective on February 5 makes obligatory the licensing of all plumbers practising in New Bruns wick. Licenses will be issued by the Plumbers' Examining Board which is to consist of the Chief Medical Health Officer of the Province, one journeyman and one other member who must be an employing plumber. The appointment of the examining board is to be made by the Minister of Health The board is to draw up regula tions for the examination of plum bers, and examinations are to be held semiannually. PLumbers who have been working for five years will be required to obtain a license, but will not need to take the examination. They will however be required to pay the license fee, which is \$5 for the first year and \$2 each year in which a rene wal license is taken out. Those candidates who fail to pass the examination will receive back \$3 of the \$5 license fee.
