### The Empire's Resources.

Only hard figures can adequately tell he story of the resources of the British Empire. In the production of staple articles, that part of the world under our flag has some amazing facts to unfold. Take the year 1911, for example. During that year staple products to the following values were produced within the British Empire: Coal, £125,800,000; diamonds, £8,899,-000; gold £55,900,000; silver, £4,

Turning to quantities from mere cash values, the British Empire produces of wheat, 988,700,000 bushels; of wine, 6,500,000 gallons; of tea, 455,-600,000 lb.; and of cotton, 1,279,616,000 lb. All our Overseas Dominions contribute their quota to the above amazing totals, and the figures of our smaller Colonies, such as Newfoundland. give one the idea that such Dominions ere, after all, not quite so small as one
