A TURKISH REPULSE. CAIRO, Feb. 5.

The following official statement recounting the repulse of the Turkish force which attacked the Suez Canal was given out here yesterday.

At daybreak Wednesday the enemy advanced on our posts at Toussoum 35 miles north of the Suez where they attempted to cross the Canal Tuesday night, and their artillery bombarded Tousseum and Seraperim. Our artillery, supported by ships in the Canal replied. The enemy tried to cross the Canal on rafts but retired in the afternoon with the loss of eight officers and numerous dead, while 282 pristwo officers and 13 men killed, and 58


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
