### KINGS.

Kings were invented shortly after the earth cooled off. From that time to this, most countries have had kings, but the disease is now steadily decreasing in severity, and is well under control.

As the world grew more civilized, however, it amused itself with politics, instead of fighting. This is a very difficult game and of late kings have not been allowed to interfere in it very much. Nowadays, a king is expected to wear plenty of uniforms, to open new churches and colleges, to give free parades whenever possible, and to provide plenty of descendants, but he is not allowed to get gay with the statue books any more. In fact, he has been denatured and mitigated until he is now scarcely more exciting than a president's aide-de-camp.
