



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will anyone be disposed to disagree with the statement that the manner in which it has so far been handled in the Legislative Council has been highly creditable to that Chamber in most respects. There had

been more than one hint from Government quarters that if the Upper House dealt roughly with the Bill it would itself be "brought to order" in quick time. So far from this threat ened conflict of the two Houses ma terialising, the other extreme seem likely, and we may have the extra-ordinary spectacle of the two con-

sulting over a money Bill. The opin-ions expressed in the Council have moderate, almost conciliatory They have been none the less emphatic and convincing, all the speakers, with the expected exceptions, condemning the principle and details of the measure. If its promoters read the objections there set forth with the open mind which it is their duty to preserve, they would find them so unanswerable and so radical that they would without hesitation abandon the Bill altogether and proceed on entirely new lines in their endeavour to raise money. If that takes them time it is the fault of none but themselves: let them devote to the consideration

which the matter deserves the six weeks which they deliberately and amelessly wasted at the beginning

of the session But a point has arisen of the first importance which it is most neces-sary to emphasise. Yesterday's debate conveys a suggestion that some members of the Upper House are under the impression that it can amend this bill. Mr. Knowling, we note, asked Mr. Squires whether the Government would accept amendments, and was informed that it would en-tertain none that upset the principle of the measure. Whatever may be meant by the "principle" contained in the whole composition, Mr. Squires

did not make the reply which, as a lawer, he knew he should have made He should have said, "This House has no power whatever to make any amendments to this Bill." The ques-
