Crew of "J. B. Bradley" Landed at Barbados.

Word was received to-day saying
that the schooner Gladys Monster had
arrived at Barbados, having on board
the crew of the schooner J. B. Brad-
ley which left Sydney for this port on
Oct. 24th, and was given up as lost.
The schooner Bradley was coal laden
and met a heavy storm and had to be
abandoned on Nov. 2nd.

Derelict Asks for Tug.

The Intelligence Department re-
ceived a message to-day from the S.
S. Winfredian, reporting a four
masted barque at 4 o'clock this
morning in lat 43.01, N., long. 55.13,
W., which is about 200 miles S.S.W. of
Cape Race; name Paul of Hamburg,
and flying German colors with fore-
mast, and mizen top gallantmast
gone, but carrying fore sail, main
lower topsail, staysails, and spanker.
The barque reported having lost all
her sails and boats, but the crew did
not wish to abandon her. She asked
to be towed but the Winfredian was
unable to do so. The derelict then
asked to have a tug wirelessly for
and the steamer continued her voyage.
The barque appeared to be in bal-
last and was floating lightly, stand-
ing to the westward on the starboard
tack. The wind blew from the north-
west in a strong breeze and the sea
was rough.

Medals for Towns.

War Decorations for famous places.
The town of Nancy, recently de-
corated by M. Poincare with the
Croix de Guerre and the Legion of
Honour, is but the latest of many
French boroughs to be similarly hon-
oured both during and after the war.
Amongst other places Amiens,
Peronne and Montdidier have been
each awarded the Croix de Guerre;
and this notwithstanding that the
two latter towns are just now little
more than mere heaps of ruins.

Some little time back, too, both
Cambrai and Douai were "mentioned"
by the President in an official "Order
of the Day," and decorated with the
Legion of Honour, in recognition of
the bravery of their citizens during
the war.

Lille, again received
its Legion of Honour quite early in
the war, being the first town to be so
decorated, and a little later on Lille
was singled out for a like distinction.

Of all towns, however, Dunkirk is
the most bemadalled, having won
three decorations, including the D.S.
O.

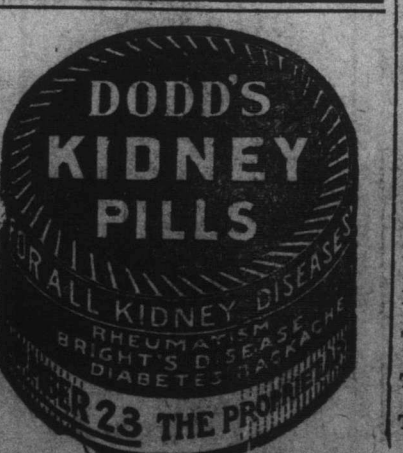
On Wednesday afternoon,

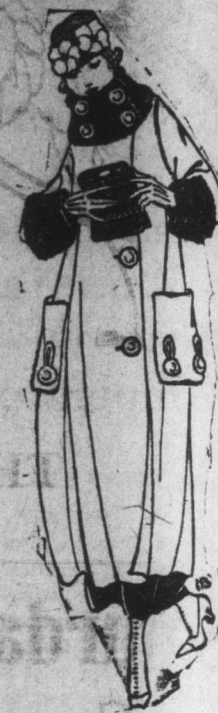

TRYING
To try too hard
to get a thing
sometimes de-
feats the ef-
fects of the
work you do.
And of noth-
ing is this more
true than of try-
ing to get to sleep.
I had that true
driven home
me this morn-
ing in a rather
interesting way.
When I am
going anywhere
that requires
early I set the alarm clock
and then I always wake one
minute to the minute before the
alarm is to go off. I look at the
clock and see that I have an hour
to sleep and I say, "Now,
just get right to sleep." And then
I am wide awake and remain
so till it is time to get up.
After I stopped trying to go to
sleep.

I have been through that dozens
of times. This morning I went through
it again with this little variation.
I went to bed at half past six.
I got up at half past five. Until
I lay there trying my hardest
to go to sleep. Then I opened my
eyes and saw that it was six fifteen.
I decided that there was no use try-
ing longer, and turned over on my
side (I always lie on my side)
and thought, "I will give up try-
ing to get to sleep." An instant
later I awoke to the sound of the
alarm. I had fallen almost instan-
taneously asleep and slept the full fifteen
minutes.
And the reason was simply that
I had stopped trying so hard as
to get my own end.
Another object lesson in relax-
ation. I relaxed to my sleepless-
ness and thereby conquered it.
Even if You Can't Sleep, You Can
Rest.

Doctors say that it simply doubt-
less harm sleeplessness does to
you. If you find you are not
sleeping, you can do one of two
things. You can say, "Oh, dear,
I'm going to get two or three hours
of sleep to-night. I shall feel so miser-
ably to-morrow. What shall I do
to get all tense and excited about
