Rev. Canon H. J. Cody was in his est vein recently when he addressed a large gathering of members of the Canadian Club in the ballroom at the King Edward Hotel. Canon Cody drew largely on the incidents of his ecent trip to England, and while at imes his hearers were in roars of aughter, there were other occasions when he touched the deeps of pathos, as when describing the funeral of Field Marshal Sir Henry Wilson, or his thoughts on viewing the tomb of the Unknown Warrior in Westminister Abbey. The subject of his address Canon Cody gave as "Towards the Sunrise," likening the position of of the children of Israel, who, in the Book of Numbers, were said to be marching in the wilderness "towards the sunrising." There was a realization, he said, in the Motherland that the people were trudging same time they had their faces towards the morning. They were passing through a period of disillusionment. The promise of the "land fit for heroes to live in," had not been fulfilled. 
