Dalhousie University Will Enter Federation.

Faculty Places Itself on Record—German Government Encouraging Uprising Against French—Only One Vital Settlement since 1918 Armistice.

GERMAN UPRISING PREDICTED.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. More trouble in the Ruhr is forecast by the French Embassy which announced it had reliable information indicating an anti-French movement, calculated to culminate in an armed uprising. The Embassy declared the German Government were known to be backing the enterprise, and it is said volunteers were coming into Ruhr to assist in the uprising and that the French were prepared to adopt rigorous measures as a result.

FRENCH GROWING NERVOUS.
DUSSELDORF, Feb. 28. Requisition of motor cars by the French reached a state of great activity to-day, the total taken numbering two hundred and fifty, with Dusseldorf as centre for commandeered cars. All cars in Ruhr were stopped and taken over, unless the occupants could show authority to use them. The French gave receipts for every car, only granting permission to travel to those belonging in occupied territory. All cars entering Ruhr from unoccupied territory are requisitioned.

GERMAN MINE OWNERS THREATENED.
DUSSELDORF, Feb. 28. By a decree issued by General Deby to-day, Hugo Stinnes and other mine owners and directors are liable to trial by court martial with possible imprisonment and fine if they refuse to pay taxes on coal production, or if they oppose French and Belgian efforts to wrest from them shipments of fuel on account of reparations.

DALHOUSIE WILL ENTER FEDERATION.
HALIFAX, Feb. 28. Dalhousie University placed itself on record here tonight as willing and desirous of entering the Federation of Universities by the Governments of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. The Carnegie Foundation of New York have agreed to subscribe three million dollars towards carrying out the Federation. The Board of Governors made their decision in resolution form expressing their "willingness and desire" that Dalhousie should enter the Federation contemplated. Dalhousie is the first of the Maritime Universities to agree to the Federation. The University of New Brunswick has definitely declared its decision not to enter, but it is pointed out the New Brunswick Institution is not essential to the plan drawn up. St. Francis Xavier College did not enter into later negotiations for Federation, but the Catholic archdiocese of Halifax expressed the desire that the Federation, if accomplished, should include a Catholic College. The Board of Governors of Acadia University recently declared against that college entering the Federation, but the final decision for Acadia rests with the United Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces which will meet at Wolfville next summer. Mount Allison University and King's College have made no official declarations. It is understood that if the present Federation plan fails of success a modified plan will be proposed.

HARDING SIGNS.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. President Harding to-day signed the British debt funding bill.

ONLY PROBLEM SETTLED.
LONDON, Feb. 28. George Harvey, United States Ambassador, addressing the Pilgrim's dinner tonight in honor of Stanley Baldwin, Chancellor of the Exchequer said the settlement of the British debt question was the first conclusive settlement of a really vital world problem since the Armistice. He said he firmly believed it enhanced the mutual respect and everlasting friendship between Great Britain and the United States, the two great nations to which the entire world is looking for the preservation of its solvency and stability. "The United Kingdom continues to rest on the rock of financial integrity and national honor," Harvey referred to the official statement of the British Government promulgated on August 1st last, which, he said, contained the specific assertion that "under the arrangement arrived at the United States insisted in substance if not in form that though the Allies were to spend the money it was only on our security they were prepared to lend it." The Ambassador expressed the opinion that at some suitable time "The British Government will, with equal formality, and no less explicitness, remove the apprehension created by this unfortunate situation. The simple fact, that barring Russia, which could not get our products, the Allies owe the United States more than they owe Great Britain." He assured his hearers the

United States had no intention of ruining the credit of any other country by cancelling its debts.

SHIPPING BILL KILLED.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28. The Administration Shipping Bill introduced one year ago to-day, was finally killed to-day in the Senate. The Senate voted sixty-three to seven to lay it aside.

MISSIONARIES MEET TROUBLE.
TORONTO, Feb. 28. Word just received to-day by the Baptist office in Toronto is to the effect that for months past Christian Missionaries in India had been meeting with unusual difficulties, and that as a result of the Ghandi movement, hostile feelings have been aroused to such extent that women have turned their backs on the white missionaries. Canadian Missionaries of the Baptist denomination working among the Telegus, have, it is reported, suffered with missionaries of other denominations in the adverse movement.

WILD WEATHER IN GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, Feb. 28. The Berengaria, bound from New York, has been anchored since Tuesday morning off Ryde, prevented by the strong storms from entering Southampton. Passengers and mail were taken off in lighters with great difficulty. The wildest kind of weather prevails throughout Great Britain, with wind at 70 miles an hour causing many deaths and much damage.

ANTI-GREEK INSURRECTION IN THRACE.

BERNE, Feb. 28. An anti-Greek insurrection in Thrace, attended by sharp encounters near Zanthi, is reported from Bulgarian sources. An organization of Thracian Nationalists is said to be starting a general movement against Greece, while the entire population of Western Thrace is now armed.

LITHUANIANS ATTACK POLES.

PARIS, Feb. 28. A Warsaw despatch confirms the report that Lithuanians again attacked Polish advance guards but were driven back with losses unknown.

FRENCH MAKE FURTHER ARRESTS.

LONDON, Feb. 28. A Cologne despatch says a French patrol entered a meeting of ten ironmasters of Bochum, arresting all of them.

ANOTHER CRIMINAL ACT.

LONDON, Feb. 28. Castle Forbes, owned by the Earl of Granard, at Newton Forbes, County Londonderry, was destroyed by a mine explosion yesterday, according to a despatch. Granard is a member of the Irish Free State Senate.

IRREGULARS ARRESTED.

DUBLIN, Feb. 28. Twenty-four irregulars were arrested at various places on Monday night, several having been apprehended while attempting to cut down the bridge, while another batch was taken at Dromore.

GERMAN NEWSPAPER SUSPENDED BY ALLIES.

COLOGNE, Feb. 28. The Allied Rhineland Commission has ordered suspension of the publication of the Frankfurter Zeitung for three months.

TWENTY KILLED IN TRAIN COLLISION.

COLOGNE, Feb. 28. Twenty persons are reported killed in a train collision at Dueren. The accident was due to the train having been switched to the wrong track.

Dear Sir:—Please allow us space in your highly esteemed paper in which to make a few remarks re the Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde article that appeared in the Advocate of the 21st inst., signed "The Workmen's Committee of the East End" thanking Mr. Davy and some others for obtaining a nine hour day, etc. What is wrong with these people? Was it not bad enough for them to get cold feet over the question of our darkest hour when Sergeant Nugent was sent to Mike Bennett's house by I. G. Hutchings as a result of misleading statements and lies by enemies of the working men? These are not very hard to find in this little country at present. Now, Mr. Editor, when this occurred, these very men who signed themselves as representing the working men went back, sat down, and hid away for the sake of an extra day's pay, and left the working man in the lurch. We are sure the Honorable Prime Minister and Hon. Dr. Campbell must have laughed when they read that article in the Advocate, because they did not know these men as a committee at all. We mean to tell the workers, who do know, as well as those who don't know, that when there was need of men to fight and explain the working man's cause, we, the undersigned, were the men who did, and would, fight. We were left alone by those men who claimed to represent the Workmen in the East End and belied by others. When our Chairman, Mr. Bennett, went before the Inspector General and Superintendent O'Neill they only then were made aware that we were belied. The result is that to-day those who were our bitterest enemies are our greatest friends because they realize that we are out for right and square dealing and nothing more. These men in the Advocate in thanking a whole plenipotentiary are apparently satisfied. Mr. Editor, we wish we too could feel like that. We are not satisfied. How can we be when we are not getting a chance to live? All the same we wish to thank, and we do greatly appreciate Hon. Sir Richard Squires and Hon. Dr. Campbell for listening to our appeal, and considering it in a humane, and from a humane standpoint. When we were getting a pailty three, four and five day's work a week it was not enough to keep body and soul together. It is bad enough now; still we thank Sir Richard Squires and Hon. Dr. Campbell for what we are receiving, and no other Government official. We, the undersigned three working men, who discussed and explained the pros and cons of our situation were instrumental in making every change and every system for the benefit of the workers, and we were proud to be able to do it, and we are ever ready to stand up for a square deal for all. "Right over might" is our motto! We do not need to hide for an extra day's pay and leave our brother workers in the lurch. Those with whom we dealt with in settling the question know where we stand in our dealings; so do the working men whom we represent. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, for space.

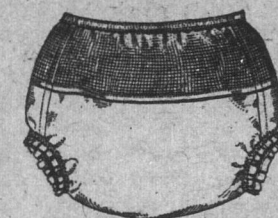

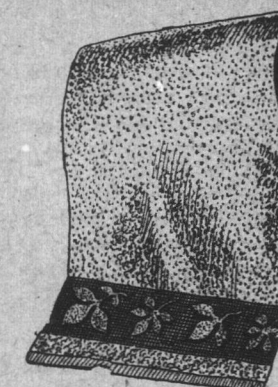

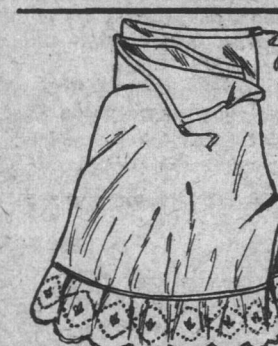
