Amongst the new bills introduced, was one by Mr. Chariton to prevent crucity to animals carried by railway. In answer to questions by Mr. DeCos-mos, the Premier declined, in the absence of a complete survey, to state when the westorn section of the Pacific Railway would be commenced. It was the inten-tion of the Government to construct a telegraph line from Exequinalt to Nana-imo, when the route of the railroad was decided upon. Dr. Orton then moved for a Committee to enquire into the condition of the ag-ricultural interest, which he alleged to be in need of protection against foreign importations of grain. He entered into a somewhat, lengtby statement in sup-port of his motion. Mr. Mackenzie would not oppose the motion, but could tell the hom. gentle-man that the legislation he proposed had heen suggested many times before, and he could assure him it would be of no benefit to the farmer if it were passed.
