THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Chief Roe's Estimates Total \$14,950 for 1892.

A Decree Compared With Last Year—The Hucker Bylaw Again—Some Important Amendments—Fire Supplies.

No. 3 Committee received the estimates for the Fire Department for 1892 from Chief Roe at a meeting last evening as follows:

Last year the estimates were \$16,400, and \$15,952.60 was expended. The estimate for this year did not include the proposed expenditure on a new water tank. A petition was received to have Colborne street, between Dufferin and Princess avenues, watered. Referred to the engineer with power.

Ald. Wm. Hesman moved that the committee arrange for street car for the street watering inspector. He had to go all over the city two or three times a day during warm weather, and the work would be done more efficiently. The chairman will ascertain the cost of a pass.

J. M. Wilson, market clerk, furnished a report on the hucker bylaw. He recommended: 1. That the bylaw be not repealed. 2. That \$1 be paid any person giving information that would lead to the conviction of a hucker violating the law. 3. That the north end of the market be boarded up, except what is required for a passage. 4. That hucksters be charged \$2 a month for a 7-foot space under the veranda, and \$4 for 14 feet. 5. That the clerk be empowered to place hucksters at the rear of stores at north side of market. The report was adopted clause by clause. In future the fruit dealers will be charged a rental for space.

Robert Duncan appeared before the committee and asked for half the contract of sweeping chimneys. The Council will be recommended to give Mr. Duncan wards 1, 3, and 6, and Mr. Berry wards 2, 4 and 5.

The matter of abolishing fish peddlers' licenses was laid over. Tenders for fire department supplies were taken up, and contracts were awarded as follows: G. W. News & Co., Montreal, 10 inch trip gong, \$50; ten pounds gong, \$30; two pairs magnets, \$3; Tanton & Ashplant, twelve pairs gun boots, \$38; Veterans Company, Brantford, 10 pound Ontario wire, \$22.50; Toronto Gutta Percha Company, six rubber coats, \$24; two play pipes, \$30; controlling nozzle, \$20; Toronto Electrical Company, four 12 inch gongs, \$40; 25 pounds office wire, \$7; class insulators, \$4.50 per 100; six disques, \$3; ten wire connectors, \$1; there were also: Ald. Fitzgerald (chairman), Hannah, Wm. Hesman, John Hesman and Moule, Secretary and Chief Clerk.
