THE WEATHER.

Toronto, July 1—11 p.m.—The pressure has continued to decrease in the lake region since last night, while in the Northwest and over the Maritime Provinces it has increased somewhat. A very severe thunder storm occurred in Toronto this morning, and during to-day thunder storms have been general in Ontario. Rain is reported throughout the Northwest Territories and Manitoba. Maximum temperatures: Calgary, 58°; Qu'Appelle, 70°; Winnipeg, 80°; Port Arthur, 72°; Toronto, 80°; Montreal, 88°; Quebec, 74°; Halifax, 90°.

For the next 24 hours for the lakes: Fresh westerly to northwesterly winds; fair, preceded by local showers or thunder storms; a little lower temperatures.
