Private Austin, during his stay in "D" Company, has made a most enviable record for his soldierly qualities and for his conduct, which was beyond reproach. Quartermaster Sergeant D. C. Kennedy took the chair, and after a few preliminary remarks called on Private H. T. Millie to make the presentation. The gift consisted of a valuable sundial ring set with diamonds, and a gold watch, the latter bearing the inscription, "Presented to Private James A. Austin by his comrades of 'D' Company, I. S. Corps." Private Austin, who was referred to in the speech by Private Austin was held, and the deep regret which his fellow-comrades of the cricket and football teams would feel at his removal from their midst. He was followed by Private Burns, who hoped that Comrade Austin would win as high esteem in "C" as he had done in "D" Company. After several musical contributions from Private Hutchinson the meeting broke up with three hearty cheers for Private Austin.

Askin Street Methodist Church Sunday School Anniversary.
Anniversary services in connection with Askin Street Methodist Church Sunday school were held yesterday. There were three services, and despite the inclement weather all were well attended, both by the pupils and by parents and friends of the school. The morning service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Treleven, of St. Thomas, and a fine sermon was given. He chose for his text, I. Samuel, xvi, 11: "Send and Fetch Him." He drew part of many choice lessons from the life of David, illustrating his topic with stories and anecdotes from every-day life, and interested both old and young in the study of the subject. In the afternoon there was an open meeting of the school in the church, then short addresses were given by Mr. Learn, the genial superintendent, who introduced Rev. J. E. Laneley, of Colborne Street Church, Rev. Mr. McIntyre, the pastor, and Mr. Brenton, a former superintendent of the school, all of whom gave short appropriate addresses. In the evening the preacher was Rev. A. C. Courtney, of Dunn Street Church, and the foundation for his discourse was Ecclesiastes, xii, first clause, first verse: "Remember also thy creator in the days of thy youth." The importance of directing the youth of the land to a proper understanding of their relation to God, and the ease with which it can be done in early life by parents and teachers, was exemplified. A proper recognition of God and his laws, the preacher pointed out, would enable the young to live happy lives here and prepare for a glorious hereafter. It was, he said, a devil's lie to say that a boy had to "grow his wild oats." Wild oat-sowing was always disastrous and degrading, for was it not asserted in the Bible that whatsoever a man sows that shall he also reap? At all the services, the children, under their indefatigable music master, Mr. John Ward, sang in a most harmonious manner a number of the choicest pieces. Clara Thomson presided at the organ efficiently. An orchestra, consisting of Messrs. Melville Hicks, Corvet Jarvis, R. Tatham, S. T. Cook, Elmer W. W. and Ed. Lang, accompanied the singing. Though they

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have played together but for a few weeks, they proved a valuable acquisition. The school is prosperous, and the visiting pastors congratulated the superintendent and teachers on the fact.

The Emma Juch Festival.
The opera festival at the Grand Opera House next Friday evening by the Emma Juch Grand English Opera Company will undoubtedly prove the musical sensation of the season. The Juch organization numbers 100 people, requiring a special train of nine cars to transport them from place to place. This company is pronounced by the press and the entire United States to be the largest and most important musical organization traveling. During Miss Juch's recent engagement in Washington, she was the most popular of the social attractions, and was probably ever bestowed upon any American artist. Her performances there were attended by President Harrison, Mrs. Harrison, Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British Minister, Lady Ponsonby, and her charming daughter, the French, Russian, German and Austrian Ministers, the Spanish Envoy, and in fact the chiefs of all foreign legations. During the week Miss Juch was received privately at the White House by Mrs. Harrison, entertained here, and was made the recipient of many musical floral offerings, sent to her during her different performances, by the first lady of that land. The opera selected for her will be Richard Wagner's masterpiece "Lohengrin," with Miss Juch as Elsa, a characterization for which she has received unstinted praise from the leading musical critics throughout the country. This production will be mounted in the most sumptuous manner. It requires no less than four cars to handle the scenery, costumes, electrical and other novel effects used by this company. The orchestra will number 50 solo instrumentalists, while the chorus will consist of 80 powerful voices. The sale of seats will open to-morrow morning, and a great rush is sure to ensue for the choicest of seats.

Rev. T. E. Harrison, pastor of the Elizabeth Street Church, preached a powerful sermon Sunday evening on temperance, and impressed upon the members and adherents of the church the necessity of joining themselves with those who were fighting against the liquor traffic. He founded his remarks on Joshua, v, 13: "Art thou for us, or art thou an adversary?" He declared that the greatest obstacle man had to contend with was temperance, which has strongly fortified itself in every part of the world. It had some of the greatest forces on its side, inasmuch as it had pressed sociability into its service. Many would gladly join the church, but that they were fast in the chains of intemperance, and nothing but the power of God could free them. Men might reason and fight on the side of the liquor traffic, but it was doomed. God had declared its doom, and he had cursed the man who put the bottle to his neighbor's lips with a bitter curse. Some men in defending the liquor traffic say that it is as necessary for us as any other business and that the Government had given men permission to engage in it, but God's word declares that men shall not engage in it. He said, "perish, perish, perish the system in the world, but that did not make the evil any better. There had been many laws on the statute books regulating the traffic, but they had failed to do any good. What was needed was a prohibitory law which would stop the traffic entirely. There could be no neutrality. Everyone must be on one side or the other. The cause of previous defeats in this matter has been neutrality. Where there was the least fighting, there the great mass of people were to be found who professed to be on the right side, but all they did was to profess. Mr. Harrison concluded by exhorting his hearers to get on the right side, and that at once.

In the King Street Methodist Church last evening the Rev. S. Bond preached a sermon on temperance, particularly discussing the question whether the Bible approved of the use of intoxicants, and concluding by declaring that the Bible condemned only drunkenness and allowed the use of wine, it was necessary to investigate, to find out whether it approved of intoxicating wine. He showed that in 28 cases the word wine referred to vine fruit as to corn and oil, and approved of it. "English readers by taking Young's Analytical Concordance could investigate for themselves. In 141 cases a word is used which does not in itself determine its character. Yet here it is mentioned with condemnation by warning or incident 71 times, without uncertainty or neutrality 31 times, and with the idea of permitted enjoyment 26. In these latter cases there is nothing to show that it is intoxicating, and no case is that which certainly intoxicates spoken of with approval. But where it certainly means intoxicating drink it is condemned 130 times. An able author says that only 20 times is wine approved, and then it is unqualifiedly approved. The whole scope of Bible teaching is to condemn the use of that which intoxicates. He pointed out the subterfuge of quoting one set of passages to prove that wine is mentioned which was intoxicating, and another class to show that the use of wine was approved. This proves nothing. Is the intoxicating wine approved? It is not; it is condemned many times. So even its so-called moderate use has no countenance, but condemnation. How can any good or any sane man use such a beverage?"
