Proposal to Suspend Silver Coinage if Parity is Not Maintained.

Scenes of the Wildest Enthusiasm Follow Bryan's Defense of the Silver Scheme.

Endeavorers in a Gale.

The Big Tent at Washington Demoralized by a Storm.

But Bad Weather Does Not Dampen the Delegates' Ardor.

Washington, July 10.—The biggest of the three tents erected for the Christian Endeavor convention was blown down in Wednesday night's storm. It was called "Tent William." The canvas was soaked and torn, and the tent will not be available for use until today.

The Endeavorers were astir early, making their way to the many churches set apart for the sunrise services, which begin the exercises of each day. The services lasted from 6:30 to 7:15 o'clock. A short adjournment for breakfast and a walk about town, and many of the delegates were gathered again at the big New York Avenue Presbyterian Church to participate in a Bible book study, conducted by President C. C. Burroughs, D.D., of Crawfordsville, Ind. Tents Washington and Endeavor were calculated to accommodate 10,000 each, but were crowded before the services began.

The vast ellipse on which the tents were pitched was in bad condition on account of the rain. In tent Washington President Francis E. Clark, of Boston, Mass., presided, and Percy S. Foster, of Washington, acted as director of the vast chorus of singers. The programme opened with "Hymn of Welcome," especially composed for this convention by Col. John Hay, rendered with grand effect by the chorus, and the address of welcome of the committee of '96 was delivered by W. H. H. Smith, chairman of the committee, which elicited an appropriate response from Rev. R. J. Service, of Detroit. Delegates listened to the reading of the report of Secretary John Willis Easer, and the annual address of the president, Francis E. Clark. The services in tent Endeavor were conducted by Howard B. Grosbe, of Boston, with O. E. Excell, of Chicago, in charge of the music. The address of welcome to the visitors, on behalf of the District of Columbia, was delivered by Commissioner John W. Ross, and responded to by Prof. W. W. Andrews, of Sackville, New Brunswick. Otherwise the services were similar in every respect to those conducted in tent Washington, the annual reports and addresses being duplicated for the benefit of the thousands unable to secure admission to the first-named tent.

CANADIAN ODDFELLOWS.

Amendments to the Rules of the Order—Officers for the ensuing year.

Chatham, Ont., July 11.—Yesterday morning's session of the Order of Grand Lodge of Oddfellows was devoted entirely to the discussion of resolutions. A motion, the object of which was to make the sick benefit a Grand Lodge fund, and taking it out of the funds of the subordinate lodges, was amended by adding the following: "And any lodge failing to pay such levy within thirty days from date of notice to pay such levy, and a proper written complaint being made of such default to the grand master, he may, by virtue of his office, suspend such subordinate lodge from all benefits from the fund of the order until such levies are paid, the assurance and endowment excepted."

The motion to extend the assurance limit to \$2,000 in ordinary risk only was referred to a committee to report at the Grand Lodge in '97. The grand medical referee was on motion, given power to reject any candidate, either for cause of occupation. Sec. O. Art. 5 was amended by the elimination of all to "grand secretary" in the fifth line, and the substitution of the following: "The secretary of each subordinate lodge shall, on or before the 20th day of January in each year, make a return of its members and financial standing, including all assets and liabilities, at the close of the past year to the grand secretary, and the whole, etc." One member of the order, a large is to be added to the executive officers.

In future the grand master will appoint a committee of seven to elect members to strike the standing committees.

A motion to allow delegates 3 cents per mile traveling expenses was voted down, about 30 hands being raised against it.

The report of the finance committee was read and discussed. The election of officers resulted as follows: Grand master, T. A. Wardell, Dundas; deputy grand master, R. Clark, Troy, Ont.; grand secretary, R. Fleming, re-elected; grand treasurer, G. Boxall, re-elected; grand medical adviser, Dr. Brigham, re-elected; grand warden, Webster, Owen Sound; grand inner guard, R. S. Dunlop, Chatham, Ont.; grand chaplain, W. Ray, Thamesville, Ont.

Chicago, July 10.—The crowds were early in motion yesterday towards the Coliseum, and by ten o'clock the hall was packed with 20,000 people. The uppermost topic in the mouths of all was what would the gold men do when the silver platform had been passed. It was known that many individual delegates from New York, Pennsylvania and other Eastern States had expressed the determination to leave the convention if the silver men nominated, although acting under the advice of Hill, Whitney and others, it had been resolved that there would be no bolt of gold men in a body or as a whole.

When the resolutions committee report in favor of silver was presented, Senator Hill moved a minority report, concluding in these words: "Until international co-operation can be secured, we favor the rigid maintenance of the gold standard as essential to the preservation of our national credit." Tillman offered his resolution denouncing President Cleveland. This was greeted with hisses and jeers, and some little cheering.

The report of the minority of the committee on resolutions, presented by Senator David B. Hill, says: Sixty delegates, constituting the minority of the committee on resolutions, find many declarations in the report of the majority to which they cannot give their assent. Some of these are wholly unnecessary. Some are ill-considered and ambiguously phrased, while others are extreme and revolutionary of the well recognized principles of the party. The minority content themselves with this general expression of their dissent, without going into specific statement of these objectionable features of the report of the majority.

But upon the financial question, the views of the majority differ so fundamentally from what the minority regard as vital Democratic doctrine, as to demand a distinct statement of what they hold to be a just and true expression of Democratic faith upon this paramount question.

We declare our belief that the experiment on the part of the United States alone of free silver coinage, and a change of the existing standard of value independently of the action of other great nations would not only imperil our finances, but would retard or entirely prevent the establishment of international co-operation, to which the efforts of the Government should be steadily directed.

It would place this country at once upon a silver basis, impair contracts, disturb business, diminish the purchasing power of the wages of labor and inflict irreparable evils upon our national commerce and industry.

Until international co-operation among leading nations for the free coinage of silver can be secured, we favor the rigid maintenance of the existing gold standard as essential to the preservation of our national credit, the redemption of our public pledges, and the keeping inviolate of our country's honor. We insist that all our paper and silver currency shall be kept absolutely at a parity with gold.

The Democratic party is the party of hard money, and is opposed to legal tender paper money as part of our permanent financial system, and we therefore favor the gradual redemption of the national debt, and the cancellation of all United States notes.

"Our advocacy of the independent free coinage of silver being based on belief that such coinage will effect and maintain a parity between gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, we declare as a pledge of our sincerity that, in future, the coinage shall fall to that ratio. If the party in power fail to effect such parity within one year from its enactment by law, such coinage shall thereupon be suspended."

There had been an outburst of enthusiasm, when Dr. B. Hill finished his great rhetorical effort in antagonism to the platform presented by the committee. The vast assemblage had listened to a sensational speech by Senator Tillman, replete in impassioned expression, and in incrimination of President Cleveland, and had showed approval and disapproval by cheers and hisses, but when Wm. J. Bryan had been cast into the arena of Presidential hope as a full-fledged candidate for his party's nomination.

An attempt on the part of Senator Tillman to have the convention condemn President Cleveland and his administrative policy was frustrated by many protests from Senator Jones and Mr. Bryan, who, though admitting anti-administration in their views, described any abuse of the man who had been twice the choice of their party. Senator Tillman admonished by the cheering which gave commendation to the remarks of Jones and Bryan, withdrew his resolution.

At night the candidates for the nomination were named by noted orators, and the usual demonstrations followed. Bland, Boies and Bryan being evidently the favorites.
