"If we could have passed the Brooklyn, and I believe we could," said Admiral Cervera to Commodore Schley in the cabin of the Iowa, "I could have fire on the Brooklyn were carried out, but your ship has a charmed life, sir," and the sad-faced admiral, with tears in his eyes, added: "My career is ended. I shall go back to Spain to be killed

or die in disgrace." Commodore Schley put out his hand and rested it on Cervera's shoulder. He speaks perfect Spanish, and said: "Admiral, you are a brave man, and coming out as you did, in the face of a superior force, is but an exemplification of that bravery. Your country can but do you honor.

MANILA'S INSURGENT MARINE. Madrid, July 12-8 a.m.-An official dispatch from Iloilo, Philippine Islands, says Aguinaldo, the insurgent leader, is patrolling the coast with a squadron of merchantmen. Two bands of insurgents at Cebu have been defeated, and three insurgent leaders have been captured and shot. The official dispatch says there is no news from other parts of the island. A Query.

HAVE THE DONS SKIPPED? Under date of June 10, the London Times correspondent telegraphs from Santiago: Either the Spanish have moved out of the city, leaving a few men to cover their retreat, or have withdrawn into the city and are waiting behind barricades. dent says: Major-General Shafter believes that the main body of the Spanish army has abandoned Santiago, and that it is now fleeing to the westward. It is expected as I write this that the American army will be in full possession of the city by noon tomorrow. A joint attack by the army and navy was made upon the city late this afternoon, and much destruction must have been wrought by the American guns on land and sea. To this attack the Spaniards made only a feeble reply. The United States loss was insignificant. No really earnest attempt to reduce Santiago was made today. EVACUATED THE CITY while the Spanish commander has been parleying with General Shafter over terms of surrender. This belief is strengthened by the reports from Aguadores, which place has been abandoned by the Spaniards.

DUMMY GUNS. "Bands of Cuban soldiers report the enemy, before evacuating the coast town, placed timbers over their en-trenchments to represent guns. In my dispatches yesterday the fact that the Spanish commander has authorized his men to loot Santiago was told. The news, taken in connection with Gen. Shafter's belief that the Spaniards have crossed the bay and now are retreating to the westward, causes great apprehension in the American ranks. Our troops fear that when they capture Santiago they will not take the Spanish army too, and they are keenly disappointed over the prospect of finding only an abandoned and pillaged city. At the same time the belief is general that the evacuation of the city and the escape of the Spanish army surrounded, but the line was thin, and would be the most natural tactics for Gen. GEN. MILES AT THE FRONT. Gen. Nelson A. Miles, commanding the United States army, arrived at Santiago Bay shortly after noon yesterday (Monday). Upon his arrival communication was opened with Admiral Sampson, and the two commanders were soon in conference. During the early afternoon Gen. Miles landed got away. My orders to concentrate at Playa del Este and communicated with Gen. Shafter, commanding the American forces before Santiago, by telephone. It is understood to have been Gen. Miles' purpose to proceed immediately to Gen. Shafter's headquarters at Siboney, and after discussing with Shafter the latter's plan of campaign, to make a personal examination of the American position. It is not to be understood that Gen. Miles is to supersede Gen. Shafter in command of the United States forces before Santiago. Gen. Shafter is operating there under written instructions from the secretary of war, approved by the president, and so long as he is able physically to direct the troops he will retain his command.

SUNDAY'S FIGHTING. From 4 o'clock on Sunday afternoon Strong's Pharmacy. until dark the American guns poured a deadly fire into the Spanish lines. Off Santiago de Cuba, via Playa del Este, July 12.-At half-past 9 yesterday morning, after several range-finding shots over the ridge protecting Sanshots over the ridge protecting Santiago from the sea, the United States cruiser Newark opened fire into the city with her 8-inch guns. The signal corps officers, stationed on top of the corps officers, stationed on top of the ridge, reported the effect of the shots. The New York, Brooklyn and Indiana, participated in the firing at intervals of five minutes. The bombardment lasted for two hours, when Gen. Shafter falling in the bay and doing but little damage.

A TELLING SHOT.

The last shot, however, struck a prominent church in the heart of the city, which was heavily stored with powder and ammunition, causing a tremendous explosion. The extent of the damage is not yet known. When the warships ceased firing and before Gen. Shafter had begun a land attack.

CERVERA'S SHATTERED SHIPS. The board of survey, appointed to examine the wrecks of the Spanish ships, reports that only one can possibly be saved. She is the Infanta Maria Teresa, the former flagship of Admiral Cervera. The hull of the Cristobal Colon shows she was only hit six times, and then only by shells of 8-inch, 4-inch and six-pound caliber. This verifies the story that the commander of the Cristobal Colon surrendered because he saw she could not get away from the Brooklyn and the Oregon, and to continue the battle meant sacrifice of life. It was found that the brass plugs of the large guns and the bolts and locks of the small arms had been thrown overboard. The Vizcaya showed she had been riddled by the Brooklyn and Oregon. She had not been struck by projectiles larger than eight inches.
