# Buller in Camp At Laing's Nek

The Boers Obliged to Abandon Their Stronghold.

The Tunnel Dynamited at Both Ends, but Not Much Damaged—Hunter Routs the Boers Around Smaldeel—Kruger Said to Have Carried Away \$17,500,000 in Gold -British Casualties in Recent Operations.

London, June 14 .- Gen. Buller enter- , patches show that Gen. Hunter routed Volksrust on Wednesday, passed through Charleston and encamped near Laing's Nek. The tunnel was not much damaged. Both ends were blown up, but the engineers think that repairs can be effected in about four days. The advance troops of Gen. Buller saw the Boer rear guard four miles distant yesterday. It was estimated that 8,000 Boers were withdrawing. The townspeople of Ermelo counted fifteen guns. Three hundred Free Staters, released from guarding Van Reenen's Pass, have gone to join President Steyn's commando in the eastern part of Orange River Colony.

BRITISH CASUALTIES. Gen. Buller's casualties on June 10 have been issued by the war office. They are 26 killed, 126 wounded and 2 missing.

London, June 13.-The following dispatch has been received at the war office from Lord Roberts: "Katsbosch, June 12.—In Monday's engagement Methuen had one killed and eighteen wounded. Among the latter is Lieut. Cearle, of the 12th Battalion of Yeomanry.

"On June 7 the Derbyshire Militia lost 25 killed and 104 wounded all of

KRUGER'S BOOTY. London, June 14.—Mr. H. M. Dono-hue, the London Daily Mail's corre-spondent, insists that President Kruger took £3,500,000 in gold in his flight. President Kruger, according to a dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez, keeps a locomotive with steam up attached to the car in which he concentrates the executive offices of the government, and he intends to leave Machadodorp soon and to establish the Transvaal capital at Nelspruit, in the mountains, a fine defensive region. The state printing press is operating at Machadodorp, producing leaflets containing war news, for distribution among the Boers.

The Canadians

Pretoria, June 5 (by courier to Kroonstad, June 13-Special to Montreal Star) .- I was present when Lord Roberts' troops made their triumphant entry into Pretoria on Tuesday, June 5. It fell to the lot of the Canadian Regiment to be included in the march past the British field marshal and his staff, who were stationed in the square in front of the parliament buildings in

In the operations leading up to the capture of Pretoria, Gen. Hutton, with the mounted Canadians, marched on the extreme left of the British forces from Johannesburg to Pretoria. When the British forces came in touch with the fire from the Boers before the city and from the forts of Pretoria on Monday, Gen. Hamilton's advance was being made over the hills to the left of the city. As he advanced the Gordons and Cornwalls held these hills under a heavy rifle fire. The duty assigned to the Canadians now was to guard the baggage left in these hills by the troops above-mentioned. From the position the Canadians held in the hills a fine view was obtained of the West Australian Mounted Infantry, the Australian Lancers and Saxe's Mounted Infantry, as they charged down the valley behind ridges lined with Boer defenders, who field precipitately. This charge was one of the few grand spectacular sights of the war. It was followed shortly afterwards by the advance of Watson's Australians upon the city with a demand of surrender, and by 6 o'clock on Monday night the Landdrost brought the keys of the city to Field Marshal Roberts as a formal token of sur-

render. SERGT. RYAN.

Word has been received at Kentville, N. S., from Sergt.-Major Ryan, of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, who was reported on April 29 as missing near Bloemfontein. Letters arrived from him written at Wynburg Road, May 6, in which he tells of the way he was cut off while doing scout duty. He gained Gen. French's division, and reported the enemy to him, and was able to direct two regiments and a battery of machine guns towards the

SERGT. BOWDEN.

A letter written from Bloemfontein. May 10, was received in Windsor yesterday from Sergt. R. B. Bowden. He is ill with enteric fever in the hospital The first part of the letter is written at Bowden's dictation, but he was evidently too ill to continue, as the remainder is in his friend's language. Bowden was taken ill while at the front. A peculiar thing about the fever is the susceptibility of its victims to a relapse after apparently fully recovering. A soldier from Guelph, Ont., was discharged, apparently cured, but ate a piece of cheese and was dead in a few hours. Fever victims are usually given a long rest before going back to hard service.

## Beaten!

After an All-Day Fight With Roberts' Force.
