\$142,161,200 ASKED FOR PAYING PENSIONS

United States Interior Department's Total Estimates Are \$170,000,000.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The estimates for the expenditures of the United States interior department during the fiscal year beginning next July, aggregate \$170,000,000, of which \$142,161,200 is asked for pensions alone and the administrative work of the pension bureau, \$1,944,720 being for salaries of the bureau personnel, and \$550,000 for the investigations by special examiners of pension cases. In addition to the \$13,515,200 already appropriated for the twelfth census, \$1,972,120 for the next year is asked.

"SCRAP IRON" VALUATION UPHELD.

Judge McDougall, McCrimmon and Gibson this morning, in county court, at Toronto, gave judgment that the "scrap iron assessment" of street railways, telephone and electric light companies still holds good, despite the amendment of the assessment act passed at last session of the Ontario Legislature, permitting the whole of the assessment to be made in one ward of a town or city. This amendment, the judges held, does not affect the basis of valuation. They also held that rolling stock is realty, not personalty, and is therefore assessable of course as "scrap iron."

UNWILLING BALLOON TOURISTS.

San Francisco, Nov. 4.—A captive balloon containing nine people, one woman and eight men, broke from its fastenings at Eleventh and Polson streets Saturday evening and floated to the neighborhood of Redwood City, about 30 miles distant. The occupants of the balloon are reported to have landed unharmed.

MANY ILLIT RATES

The United States Has 2,326,295 Who Are of Voting Age.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The census report on school, militia and voting ages for all states and territories shows the following summary for the country as a whole: Persons of school age, 5 to 20 years, 26,110,788, of whom 24,897,130 are native born, 2,213,658 are foreign born; 13,086,160 are males; males of militia age, 16,360,363, of whom 13,132,280 are native born and 3,228,083 are foreign born; and males of voting age, 23,229,819, of whom 16,227,285 are native born and 7,002,534 are foreign born.

NO GUN FOR GERONIMO.

JOTTINGS FROM NEAR-BY PLACES

Coval, Nov. 4.—The Presbyterians of Chalmers Church, Dunwich, are building a new church, which, when completed, will be one of the handsomest edifices of the kind in the suburban districts of Ontario. It is being built of brick and stone in the latest style. The auditorium and Sunday school room are on the same floor, separated by a roller partition. The seating capacity of the structure is about 400. Mr. N. R. Darragh, of St. Thomas, is the architect, and the building committee are highly pleased with his services. The church, when completed, will be dedicated about the middle of January, 1902. LIGHTS GO OUT FOREVER!

Buglers Sound "Taps" From Heights of the Rainbow City's Electric Tower.

And the Beautiful Pan-American Exposition Becomes a Thing of the Past—Sham Battle Between Geronimo's Braves and Uncle Sam's Bluecoats—A Noisy Night on the Midway—Features of Closing Hours.

Buffalo, Nov. 4.—The Pan-American Exposition ended at 12 o'clock Saturday night. At midnight President John G. Milburn pressed an electric button and the lights in the famous electric tower grew dim for the last time. Slowly, one by one, the light on post and pinnacle and tower faded away.

A corps of buglers standing in the tower sounded "taps," and one of the greatest spectacles of the exposition, the electrical illumination, passed away, and the exposition was ended.

PETTY THIEVING.

A large crowd attended the exposition Saturday. The exhibit buildings were jammed during the afternoon, and there was considerable petty thieving of exhibits by souvenir hunters. The fruit and wine exhibits in the horticultural building suffered the greatest loss from the depredations of the crowd, and it finally became necessary to turn the people out of the building and close the doors.

THE SHAM BATTLE.

One of the greatest spectacles of the fair was a sham battle between several hundred Indians, representing about all of the famous tribes of this country, and a detachment of United States soldiers, in the world-renowned Pan-American Stadium. On both sides the firing line were men who have helped to make American history. On the Indian side were no end of celebrated chiefs, who have for more than forty years participated in some of the greatest battles of the west. On the American side were regular soldiers, members of the 10th Regiment, United States regulars, so renowned for its bravery in the Philippines and in the later invasion of China.

There was old Geronimo, the Apache chief who headed in many a hostile Indian band and who is today a United States prisoner of war; a man whose ferocity is best described by that utterance of Lieutenant Nelson A. Miles: "He is the tiger of the human race." Then there was Chief Crazy Snake of the Creeks, who as late as February of the present year was in the war-path, terrorizing the white population of the Indian Territory, and causing trouble and toil. And there was Crazy Snake playing the part of the white trooper, to the amazement of 25,000 palefaces. And old Chief Flat Iron, and Chief Last Horse, who was the first of the Sioux to be killed in the Custer fight, and who says that Custer shot himself. All of these big chiefs were in the sham battle Saturday night, and they showed their black ridges at the boys in blue with well-directed aim.

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RIOT ON THE MIDWAY.

There was a veritable riot at a restaurant on the Midway in the evening. The disorder started from a quarrel between an intoxicated man and a waiter. The crowd took the part of the waiter, and wrecked the place, smashing and wrecking the place, and when they were dispersed by a stream of water from a fire hose finally put the mob to rout.

THE ATTENDANCE.

The total number of admissions for the six months was close to 8,000,000. An average of 2,000,000 admissions were figured on by the exposition officials. The great snowstorm of last April was severe blow to the exposition. An immense amount of work was undone and work on the grounds was delayed for a week. The shooting of resident McKinley was another blow to the exposition. The attendance had been increasing steadily up to the date of the assassination. The gates were closed for two days, and when they reopened there was a drop of 12 per cent in the attendance and no improvement followed.

FINANCIAL LOSSES.

The exposition has not been a financial success. It is believed the benefits derived from it will be great value to the commercial interests of the country. The primary object of the exposition was to advance the friendly relations and to foster the intercourse between the United States and the other countries of the two Americas. In this respect it has been a decided success.

The financial loss will be in the neighborhood of \$3,000,000. The statement to be issued by the officers of the exposition setting forth the expenditures and receipts will be made public some time this month. The loss upon the stock of the exposition company erected the buildings. Two hundred and ten thousand shares of common stock were sold at \$10 each. The stock was subscribed for by the citizens of Buffalo and the Niagara frontier in small lots of from one share to one hundred shares. The stock was not so severely hit by anyone. The first mortgage bonds amounting to \$2,500,000, will be paid in full.

WONDERFUL TYPEWRITER SPEED TEST.

A feature of farewell day of special interest to the typewriterists, was an exhibition of speed typewriting given in the New York State Building, under the auspices of the War Typewriter Exchange, by C. B. McGurrin, of Kalamazoo, Mich. McGurrin holds the world's record for rapid typewriting, and his exhibition was a wonderful illustration of the possibilities of the typewriter, in the hands of an expert operator.

On test work Mr. McGurrin has written in a minute, 212 words and on a test of three consecutive hours, has written from dictation on

unfamiliar matter, an average of 112 words per minute. While none of these records were equalled last evening, Mr. McGurrin wrote on test sentences at the rate of 193 words per minute, and will undoubtedly dictate matter he wrote at the rate of 123 words per minute. Under the circumstances this was certainly very fast writing, as the machine was a perfectly new one on which Mr. McGurrin had not previously written, and he was not thoroughly familiar with its action.

BUSINESS AT THE FALLS ABOUT ENDED.

Saturday was the day many residents of Niagara Falls looked forward to with regret, for they knew it marked the closing of the Exposition, which has served to draw unusual crowds to Niagara at an unusual time of year. This week the city will retire into winter quarters. Already the International Hotel has closed and the Cataract House will soon follow. The plum season with the trolley roads, as well as of the stands, has ended, and the management will renew pleasant relations with the aldermen and residents.

THE SHOW PEOPLE.

While there are very few that take any stock in the announcement that Carlisle D. Graham will go over the American falls in his barrel, the feat of Mrs. Taylor has taught the lesson that it is hard to tell what people will attempt. As to Martha Wagners, those who know her rapid trip, realize that if she is in proper condition she would just as easily go over the American fall as through the rapids. It is surprising how dear Mrs. Taylor has rendered all previous Niagara heroes and heroines. She killed off a big batch at her very first shot, and it was great game for her. Graham, Nissen, Percy, Kendall, Sadie Allen and Martha Wagners have been forgotten when they were Taylorized.

AN ACTUAL DEATH.

Just as the sham battle came to a close, considerable excitement was created, when an aged man, ashen pale, and gasping, fell from his seat. The ambulance from the hospital was quickly sent for, and the stricken man hurried to the hospital, where he expired just as the doctors arrived. The cause of death, it was learned that his name was Jas. Brown, 60 years old, of Syracuse, and a retired saddery and coach hardware dealer.

A HANDSOME GIFT.

J. N. Adam presented the city of Buffalo with the handsome organ in the Temple of Music in the Pan-American Exposition. The fine instrument will be placed in Convention Hall, and remain there until a more suitable place can be found for it. As Mr. Adam took his departure, he was met by a crowd of well-wishers, who called for him, and someone seeing the latter in the audience, motioned to him to come forward. With evident modesty he complied, and after reaching the platform, said:

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UNITED STATES CROP REPORTS.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The weather bureau has issued a crop bulletin as follows: The month has been very mild and for the most part drier than usual. The weather conditions being generally favorable for farming operations. Rain is very generally needed, however, drought being very severe in Western Texas and in the Upper Ohio Valley. Very little damage by frost has occurred. The conditions have been very favorable for gathering corn and husking has made favorable progress. In Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa a grain has made vigorous growth, but needs rain over limited areas in the two last named states. In Missouri, Illinois, Ohio and Kentucky a grain has made vigorous growth, but needs rain over limited areas in the two last named states. In Michigan the condition of the crop is very promising. Practically the whole month has been favorable for cotton picking and except over limited areas the crop is now gathered.

PLACED ON TRIAL FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Christian Scientist Held Responsible for the Death of His Son.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—At the assize court this morning James H. Lewis, a Christian Scientist, was put on trial on a charge of manslaughter. The 6-year-old son of Lewis died last August of diphtheria. The Christian Scientist method of treatment was used, and the child being treated by Christian Science methods for mumps. The court room was filled with Christian Scientists, and the defense was indicated by the counsel for the defense, Mr. W. W. Vickers, is that Lewis believed that he was not neglecting the child, and that if he further believed that it would be wrong to call in a doctor no culpability would attach to him. The mother of the child gave evidence to the facts of death, and Dr. J. H. Corveth swore to the issue by him of the death certificate in which diphtheria was named as the cause. The examination turned to some extent upon the certainty of the doctor's diagnosis and to a considerable degree upon the extent upon which the modern medical science can be regarded as possessing a final knowledge upon facts of disease. Dr. Sheard, medical health officer of Toronto, swore that the child died of diphtheria, and would have been increased had medical attendance been summoned, and his life possibly would have been saved. The case was unfinished when court adjourned.
